

Malleable Iron Founders.

Among the manufacturing industries of Oshawa none holds a higher position or is better known than The Ontario Malleable Iron Company, Limited, whose immense works on Prospect street are one of the mainstays of the town. This Company was organized in 1872 by members of the Cowan family, one of the most highly esteemed families in Oshawa, and has been managed and controlled by them ever since.

This plant was originally comparatively small and employed about fifty men. It has now grown to such proportions that steady employment is given to eight hundred men, most of them skilled laborers, who draw large wages and who make splendid citizens. The works cover about eight acres of ground, and the buildings, having floor space of nearly five acres, are modernly constructed, fireproof structures, properly equipped for the work done here. Private switches and sidings of the Oshawa Railway connect the plant with the Grand Trunk, and the output, now amounting to upwards of eight thousand tons annually, is shipped to every part of Canada, from Halifax to Vancouver. All classes of Malleable Castings are made by the Ontario Malleable Iron Co., Limited, and their reputation among the manufacturers throughout the whole Dominion is the very best. Heavy castings, such as agricultural implement and machinery parts are a specialty, and this Company brings many thousands of dollars worth of work to Oshawa.

The officers of the Company are as follows:—President, Mr. John Cowan; Vice-President, Mr. W. F. Cowan; Superintendent, Mr. J. D. Storie;

Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. H. T. Carswell. These gentlemen are all numbered among Oshawa's leading men in manufacturing and financial circles, and are connected with a number of this town's largest and most progressive concerns. They have taken an active part in the upbuilding of Oshawa, and are liberal contributors to her institutions.

FITTINGS, LIMITED.

Malleable and Cast Iron Pipe Fittings.

One of Oshawa's very large and valuable manufacturing industries, whose output is equal, if not superior, to all others in the same class in Canada, and whose trade covers the whole of Canada, from Coast to Coast, is that known as Fittings, Limited. This Company was organized in 1902, and was incorporated as a \$200,000 stock company, under a Dominion charter. The Company purchased twenty-one acres of land in Oshawa and erected a series of two-story, solid brick factory buildings with cement floors, and having a floor space of 112,000 square feet. They manufacture all kinds of Malleable and Cast Iron Pipe Fittings, making a specialty of foundry business, detachable link belting and sash weights and washers. They employ a staff of 250 skilled mechanics and their assistants, and their trade covers practically every point of importance from Halifax to Vancouver. Their annual output is over 5,000 tons, made up approximately of 1,500 tons of malleable fittings, 2,000 tons of cast iron fittings, and 1,800 tons of grey castings.

In order to handle this immense business properly and economically they have designed and built over eighty machines for threading,

tapping and facing fittings and have a permanent large force designing and building machinery continuously. The tools, such as taps, dies, reamers, facing tools, gauges, etc., are all designed and manufactured in the factory, and a large number of highest paid and most proficient men in the trade are employed here.

The officers of Fittings, Limited, are men of the highest standing and largest calibre. The President is Mr. W. F. Cowan, the Vice-President, Mr. J. D. Storie, and the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. H. T. Carswell.

**CANADA MALLEABLE STEEL RANGE CO.,
LIMITED.**

About a year and a half ago the Canada Malleable Steel Range Co., Limited, moved its plant from Toronto to Oshawa, securing a vacant school building in the south-eastern portion of the town. This was enlarged and properly equipped with modern machinery for the making of malleable steel ranges and a staff of about seventy skilled mechanics employed.

This Company was organized and incorporated about ten years ago, and has as its officers the following well-known gentlemen:—President, Mr. W. F. Cowan; Vice-President, Mr. J. D. Storie; Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. H. T. Carswell; Manager, Mr. A. E. Hager. They have branch offices and warerooms in Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, doing business from one end of Canada to the other.

The Canada Malleable Range Co., Limited, make the well-known "Canada Pride," "Kitchen Pride," and other malleable steel ranges, selling to jobbers and members of the trade throughout the country.







AN EPITOME OF CANADIAN ACHIEVEMENT

SOUVENIR INDUSTRIAL REVIEW OF THE TOWN OF OSHAWA, ONTARIO

An Epitome of her Commercial Supremacy, Manufacturing Resources and Educational Advantages with Reviews of the Representative Establishments, and Biographical Sketches of Leading Men of the Town

AMONG the thriving and prosperous towns of Ontario, Oshawa, known as the Manchester of Canada, has become one of the liveliest and most progressive in the Province.

In the year 1816, John Kerr, the first settler in Oshawa took up his residence in what is now Oshawa's N. W. Ward. In 1822 the possible water powers around this section interested many business men and from that time until 1840 a number of factories, mills, etc., sprang up along the creek. In 1840 the people of the village, then known as Skae's Corners, were granted a post office and the name was changed to Oshawa.

The first school in Oshawa was a log hut on the corner of King and Simcoe Streets, while the first religious services were held in the Union School House, built in 1835 and used as a school house during the week and a church for all denominations on Sunday.

In 1879 Oshawa was incorporated as a town and her growth in population was slow and steady. A most hopeful feature of her growth has been the steadiness which has characterized her development, and the additional fact that her expansion has been an all round one. Her industries have grown gradually from small beginnings and embrace many lines of commercial activity.

While there are many interesting events connected with the upbuilding of Oshawa and her industries, which might be chronicled, the idea of this review is more to portray Oshawa as she is to-day, from a commercial, financial and manufacturing point of view.

OSHAWA AS SHE IS.

Oshawa is now, in the year 1911, a town of about eight thousand inhabitants, and the popular prediction is that she will be a city of twenty thousand within five years. Oshawa is situated in the county of Ontario in the centre of a rich and fertile agricultural section, thirty-four miles east of Toronto and four miles east of Whitby, the County Town. Although incorporated in 1876 the greatest growth has been within the past ten years, the population of the town having doubled, and

the immense possibilities of the future having been more thoroughly realized, during that time.

From the business man's and merchant's point of view, Oshawa is an ideal town. Not only are there large manufacturing establishments situated here, but the farmers for miles

engaged in every line of commerce, while her manufactories comprise some of the largest and best known concerns in Canada. Wide granolithic sidewalks are laid throughout the town, and her business streets have this year been paved with asphalt block. Altogether Oshawa is an up-to-date town with a magnificent future.

PUBLIC UTILITIES.

Oshawa's various public utilities are well looked after. The town owns its own water-works and sewage systems, while gas and electricity for light and power are supplied at reasonable rates by a private corporation. The water is pumped from Lake Ontario, about three miles south of the town, and the electrical energy is developed on the Trent River and transmitted to a large transforming station in Oshawa.


RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES.

Oshawa's educational, religious and charitable institutions are commodious and modern. Her schools are substantial buildings, conveniently situated for the residents in every section of the community, and the curriculum embraces many branches, while the teachers employed are qualified, conscientious workers. She has a large new High School, a commodious Separate School, a large Ladies College and three Public Schools. Her Churches are handsome and costly edifices, presided over by educated, christian gentlemen, comprising all the best-known denominations.

Oshawa has a moderately equipped hospital, a Children's Shelter, a splendid new Y. M. C. A. building, a large Salvation Army building, and a public library with shelves well filled with books. The various societies and fraternal organizations are well represented, while an opera house, large skating rink, and curling rink furnish amusements for the public.

BUSINESS ADVANTAGES.

Financially Oshawa is well provided for. Three of Canada's strongest banks maintain good branch offices in the town and this is the home office of a strong Loan and Savings Corporation.

Oshawa is on the main line of the Grand Trunk Railway, the Canadian Northern Railway goes through about two miles north of the town, the Canadian Pacific is building its line through the town, the Toronto-Eastern Electric Railway will reach Oshawa within a very short time, and the local electric railway serves all portions of the town. The output of Oshawa's factories is large and varied and is shipped to almost every part of the civilized world. The manufactured goods are very varied, numbering among others:—Agricultural Implements, Automobiles, Axes, Brooms, Brushes, Canned Goods, Carriages, Flour, Gas Pipe Fittings, Hearses, Interior Fittings, Leather, Metal Roofing, Monuments, Newspapers, Organs, Pianos, Steam Fittings, Whitewear, Woollens.

There are a number of very desirable building sites in Oshawa for manufacturers, business men and residents, and the Mayor or Town Clerk will be glad at any time to give all desired information to prospective citizens.









THE ROBSON LEATHER CO., LTD. Tanners.

The largest manufacturer of upper shoe leather in Canada is the Robson Leather Company, Limited, of Oshawa, and the amount of business done by this Company is such that 125 men are given steady employment the year round.

In 1886 the late James Robson started the business in a small way, and the record since that time has been one of steady progress. The present Company was formed and incorporated in 1905, with Charles Robson, President, and F. W. Robson Vice-President. The plant has floor space of about 80,000 square feet and about five acres of ground are required. The tannery has a capacity of over 6,000 sides of leather, every week, and the trade extends from the Atlantic to the Pacific as well as considerable export trade to the old world.

The tannery is equipped with modern machinery and appliances, the vats, wheels, strippers, beams, splitters, etc., being of the latest improved models and capable of doing the finest of work with a minimum of labor and expense. The department devoted to the making of patent leather is a most complete one, and the trade on this and other lines is increasing by rapid strides. The plant is connected by private railway switches and sidings, so that the work of handling raw material and finished leather is reduced to a minimum. Warehouses of The Robson Leather Company, Limited, are situated at Montreal and Quebec, and the greater number of boot and shoe manufacturers of Canada are numbered among their customers.

The Messrs. Robson are both prominent gentlemen in the industrial and financial circles of Oshawa and of the Province. They are members of the Manufacturers' Association and of the Board of Trade and are numbered amongst the leading members of the Conservative party in Ontario County. They are strong supporters of Oshawa and her institutions, and their large industry is one of the mainstays of the town.









Mr. Merritt is a well known citizen of Oshawa, having been foreman of the wheel department in McLaughlin's factory before buying his present business.




CHIEF CONSTABLE A. F. HIND.


WILLIAM HALNAN.


Barber and Tobacconist.



THE WILLIAMS PIANO CO., LIMITED.



The factory covers a whole town block, and is solid brick, three stories in height. The main building is 386x50 feet in dimensions, while the two wings are 180x50 feet and 104x50 feet. This gives the Company a total floor space of over 100,000 square feet, besides several smaller buildings, large lumber yards, railway sidings, etc.

In 1902 the Company was re-organized, and the men put in control of the business were students of the highest art in piano construction, as well as practical piano makers. An entire revision was made in the whole instrument, in scale, acoustics, tone, touch, action and case design and the "New Scale Williams Piano" emerged as the embodiment of all that is beautiful in tone and design, and with unequalled lasting powers. Since 1902 the factory staff has been increased from 50 to 250 hands, while the added impetus given the sales by the improved instrument, and by the progressive business policy of the new officers, has increased the required output from two or three instruments per day to the present immense total of some three thousand per annum.

The sale of the "New Scale Williams" Piano and Player Piano covers Canada from coast to coast, while the export business to foreign countries is steadily growing. 




DONALD A. J. SWANSON.






E. L. VICKERY.



Electricity for lighting and power is furnished




The bar is well stocked with the popular brands of liquors and cigars, and the Queen's Hotel is, throughout, one of the best stopping places in Ontario.





Rice & Co.





Mr. Carveth was born in Peterboro county and was in business in Western Ontario for sixteen years before coming to Oshawa in 1897.



In 1910 Mr. Mundy decided to retire from the active editorship, and the Reformer Printing




E. Mundy.


