THE WESTERN ONTARIO DRAMA FESTIVAL

is a preliminary competition of the Dominion Drama Festival which will be held in the Little Theatre, Ottawa, during the week of April the twentieth, with Mr. Harley Granville-Barker as adjudicator. The group awarded the highest marks in each region will be invited to compete in the final festival and additional invitations will be given in the discretion of the Dominion Festival executive.

The plays being presented in the W. O. D. L. Festival this year have been chosen from 21 plays presented by the competing groups in preliminary performances in their own theatres throughout Western Ontario with Miss Nella Jefferis as adjudicator. In addition to the plays invited to compete the following presentations were given—The Galt Players—"King's Son, Churl's Son" by Jane Cran, and "The Basket" by Fred Jacob; The Players Guild of Hamilton—"Experiment" by Mary Pakington, and "The Proposal" by Anton Tchekof; The Woodstock Little Theatre Guild—"The Fifteenth Candle" by Rachel Lyman Field, "A Marriage Proposal" by Anton Tchekof and "The Monkey's Paw," by W. W. Jacobs; The Brantford Drama League—"The Map" by E. V. Davenport and Dorothy M. Stuart; The Columbus Players, Guelph—"The Hat Trick" by Neil Grant; The Merton Players, Bronte—"All Hallow's Eve" by Pauline B. Perrigard; and The Border Theatre Guild, Windsor—"Gilt-Edged" by Agnes Peterson.

METHOD OF ADJUDICATION

The basis of adjudication at this festival will be as follows:

ACTING—Including characterization, emphasis, gesture and make-up, 40 marks.

PRODUCTION—Including team work, interpretation, tempo and grouping, 25 marks.

STAGE PRESENTATION—Including setting, properties, lighting and costume, 15 marks.

DICTION AND AUDIBILITY-10 marks.

DRAMATIC ENTERPRISE—Governing choice of play and the possibilities offered for achievement, 10 marks.

(a) Dramatic Enterprise—enterprise, taste and judgment shown in choice of play: selection of plays that are worth while; avoidance of plays that are hackneyed, trivial and uninteresting.

(b) Possibilities offered for achievement—in choosing plays from this point of view, regard should be had for the plays to be avoided under (a), although they may offer possibilities for achievement.

AWARDS

WESTERN ONTARIO DRAMA FESTIVAL

The following trophies, medals and prizes (with previous winners) are competed for annually in the Western Ontario Drama Festival.

THE HANNA SHIELD

The gift of Mrs. W. J. Hanna, Sarnia, to be awarded to the group obtaining the highest number of marks at the W. O. D. L. Festival.

1933-Players Guild of Hamilton.

1934-London Drama League.

1935-London Community Drama Guild.

THE FULLER SHIELD

The gift of Mr. H. E. Fuller, Sarnia, to be awarded to the group obtaining the second highest number of marks at the W. O. D. L. Festival.

1935-Border Theatre Guild, Windsor.

THE JAMIESON SHIELD

The gift of Mr. D. P. Jamieson, Sarnia, to be awarded to the group presenting a Canadian play which obtains the highest number of marks in the W. O. D. L. Festival, whether or not the same presentation also wins either the Hanna Shield or the Fuller Shield.

1934-Galt Collegiate Staff Players Club.

THE MEREDITH ACHIEVEMENT TROPHY

The gift of Mr. J. S. Meredith, London, to be awarded to the group making the greatest advance over its showing in the preceding festival as determined by comparing the markings of the adjudicators in the two successive festivals. This trophy is not to be awarded to any group winning the Hanna Shield, the Fuller Shield or the Jamieson Shield, and should any of these shield winners score the greatest comparative advance in marks, it will go to the group with the next best advance in marks. All groups competing this year are eligible for this award. The London Little Theatre and the Galt Players will each be considered as one group. In the event of one group having more than one play presented in the W. O. D. L. Festival the play receiving the highest marking will be taken into account in awarding this trophy.

The gift of Mrs. A. D. Jordan, London, to be awarded for the best male performance during the W. O. D. L. Festival (originally given for the best performance, masculine or feminine).

THE BRICKENDEN MEDAL

A PRIZE OF \$50.00

Given by the W. O. D. L. Executive for the best play, judged as a dramatic composition, written by a person resident in Western Ontario and presented during the preliminary performances—to be divided equally between the author and the group presenting the play. This award will be made upon Mr. Allan Wade's recommendation. Major Andrew Cory, Windsor, the author of "CONFLICT" presented by the Border Theatre Guild, Windsor, and Major W. E. Harris, Sarnia, the author of "TWENTY-FIVE CENTS" presented by the London Little Theatre, are eligible for this prize.
