CONSTITUTION OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK CHAPTER AMERICAN SOCIETY OF HEATING, REFRIGERATING AND AIR-CONDITIONING ENGINEERS, INC.

Approved by the Society December 27, 1983

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the organization is the New Brunswick Chapter (herein "Chapter") of the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers, Inc. (herein "Society").

ARTICLE II - PRINCIPLE OFFICE

The principle office of the Chapter is located in the City of Moncton. in the Province of New Brunswick.

ARTICLE III - OBJECTS

The objects of the Chapter are exclusively scientific and educational and include, but are not limited to: (I) the advancement of the sciences of heating, refrigerating and air-conditioning engineering and related sciences; (II) the continuing education of the members and other interested persons in said sciences, through lectures, demonstrations, and publications; (III) the rendition of career guidance and financial assistance to students of the sciences; and (IV) the encouragement of scientific research.

ARTICLE IV - POWERS

The Chapter shall have the power to perform all lawful acts which may be deemed necessary for the proper and successful prosecution of the objects and purposes for which it is organized and operated, consistent with the Certificate of Consolidation. Bylaws, and Rules of the Board of Directors of the Society, and with the provisions of Section 149 (1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act of 1971, as amended, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.

ARTICLE V - LIMITATION OF POWERS

- 5.1 The Chapter is not operated for the pecuniary profit of its members: no part of the net income of the Chapter shall be payable to or shall otherwise be available for the personal benefit of any proprietor, employee or shareholder; no salary emolument or compensation shall be paid to any member and no part of the activities of the Chapter shall consist of the performance of particular services for individual members.
- 5.2 The Chapter shall not have the authority to act for or in the name of the Society and notice to such effect shall be imprinted on the Chapter stationery; the Chapter shall not use the name of the Society except as a part of its own name; the Chapter shall not use the emblem of the Society without the written approval of the Board of Directors of the Society; and the Chapter shall not incur any financial liability or contractual obligation in the name of the Society.
- 5.3 The Chapter shall not issue publications for distribution to persons other than members without prior approval of the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 5.4 The Chapter shall not contribute to, affiliate with, or hold membership in any society, association, council, or other organization without prior approval of the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 5.5 The Chapter shall not recommend, endorse or approve any product, service, publication, person or entity for the promotion of private interests.

ARTICLE VI - DISSOLUTION

- 6.1 Upon the dissolution of the Chapter, any assets remaining thereafter shall be conveyed to the Society.
- 6.2 In the event that the Society is not then in existence or is not then exempt under Section 149 (1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act of 1971, as amended, or under such successor provision of the Act as may be in effect at such time, the assets shall be conveyed to such organization then existent, dedicated to the perpetuation of objectives similar to those of the Society and exempt.

ARTICLE VII - AMENDMENTS

- 7.1 All articles of this Constitution shall be subject to alteration or repel, consistent with the Certificate of Consolidation, Bylaws, Rules of the Board of Directors of the Society, and Section 149 (1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act of 1971, as amended, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- 7.2 Amendments to this Constitution, set forth in written directives of the Secretary of the Society, may be adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of said amendments shall be sent by the Secretary to all members, or an officer of the Chapter shall read said amendments at the next succeeding meeting.
- 7.3 Amendments to this Constitution may also be initiated by a written resolution of a majority of the Board of Governors or of not less than five (5) members in good standing with voting privileges, presented at any meeting of the Chapter. If approved by a majority of the members present, the Secretary shall mail copies of the proposed amendments to all members not less than seven (7) days before the next succeeding meeting. If approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at such meeting, the Secretary shall forward such amendments to the Secretary of the Society for approval by the Charter & Bylaws Committee of the Society and review by the Regional Chairman. Amendments shall become effective only upon receipt of written notice of approval by the Charter & Bylaws Committee of the Society.

ARTICLE VIII - ADOPTION

This Constitution shall be completed and adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of the Constitution shall be sent by the Secretary to all members and shall be sent, as amended, to such persons as shall, from time to time, become members of the Chapter.

BYLAWS OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK CHAPTER OF THE

AMERICAN SOCIETY OF HEATING, REFRIGERATING AND AIR-CONDITIONING ENGINEERS, INC.

APPROVED BY THE SOCIETY

ARTICLE I - GOVERNMENT

- 1.1 <u>Governing Instruments</u>. The New Brunswick Chapter (herein "Chapter") of the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers, Inc. (herein "Society) shall be governed by its Constitution and these Bylaws, to the extent not inconsistent with the Certificate of Consolidation, Bylaws, and Rules of the Board of Directors in the Society.
- 1.2 <u>Interpretation</u>. The Board of Governors shall resolve all questions of interpretation of the Constitution and these Bylaws.
- 1.3 Rules of Order. Except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws, the conduct of meetings of the members shall be governed by the rules of procedure set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order," as revised.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- 2.1 <u>Qualification</u>. The membership of the Chapter shall consist of all members of the Society in good standing and residing in the geographic area of the Chapter, as prescribed by the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 2.2 <u>Non-Residents</u>. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a member of the Society residing in the geographic area of a Chapter may elect to be a member of another Chapter. A member may elect to belong to more than one Chapter.
- 2.3 Grade. Each member shall hold the same grade of membership in the Chapter as he holds in the Society.
- 2.4 Rights and Privileges. All Chapter members shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges, except that (i) Affiliates, (ii) Student Members, and (iii) members who have not paid Chapter fees, dues, assessments or other charges within sixty (60) days of their due date shall not be entitled to voting privileges or the right to election or appointment as an officer, governor, or committee chairman of the Chapter. All rights and privileges of a member are vested solely in the member and may not be delegated or transferred, except as provided in ARTICLE III, paragraph 3.7 hereof.

- 2.5 <u>Suspension</u>. In the event that a member does not pay all the Chapter fees, dues, assessments or other charges within six (6) months of their due date, all rights and privileges of membership in the Chapter shall be suspended. Such membership rights and privileges shall be restored to the member upon full payment thereof. Delinquency in payment of Chapter dues or other Chapter charges will not affect a member's standing in the Society.
- 2.6 <u>Termination</u>. Membership in the Chapter shall terminate upon the death of any member, the removal of a member's principal place of residence to the geographic area of another Chapter except as provided in ARTICLE II, paragraph 2.2 hereof, or the receipt of written notice by the member of termination of membership. In the event of such termination, neither the former member, nor his personal representatives, heirs or devisees shall have any right, title or interest in the Chapter or its assets.
- 2.7 Expulsion. A member may be expelled from the Society and the Chapter only upon action taken by the Board of Directors of the Society. Such action may be initiated by the Board of Governors of the Chapter by the filing of written charges and supporting evidence with the Secretary of the Society.

ARTICLE III - MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- 3.1 Regular Meetings. Meetings of the Chapter shall be held on at least a monthly basis from September through June at such time and place as is prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 3.2 <u>Annual Meeting.</u> The annual meeting of the chapter for the installation of officers and the Board of Governors and the announcement of committee appointments shall be held in the month of May at such time and place as is prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 3.3 <u>Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the Chapter may be called by the President at his discretion, or at the request of the Board of Governors or 15 percent of the members with voting rights.
- 3.4 Notice of Meetings. Timely written notice of all meetings shall be sent by the Secretary to all members setting forth the place, date and hour of the meeting and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose thereof.
- 3.5 Quorum. A quorum for the transaction of business at a meeting of the Chapter shall consist of 15 percent of the members having voting rights, except that no business may be transacted unless a majority of the Board of Governors is also in attendance.

- 3.6 <u>Majority Vote</u>. A majority of the number of votes cast in person or by proxy shall be necessary for the adoption of any matter, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws.
- 3.7 Proxies. A member may vote on any matter by a written proxy executed and dated by him. No proxy shall be valid after ninety (90) days from the date of its execution, unless otherwise provided in the proxy.

ARTICLE IV - DUES AND FINANCE

- 4.1 <u>Society Dues.</u> The annual dues for membership in the Society, as prescribed from time to time by the Society, shall be paid to the Society.
- 4.2 Chapter Dues. The Board of Governors, in its discretion and subject to the approval by a vote of members, may levy such dues, fees, charges or other assessments as are reasonable and necessary to meet the current operating expenses of the Chapter. The due date of such payments shall be as prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 4.3 Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Chapter shall end on June 30th of each year.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF GOVERNORS

- 5.1 <u>Duties.</u> The property and affairs of the Chapter shall be managed by the Board of Governors. The Board of Governors may execute all business of the Chapter that does not require action by the full membership of the Chapter. The presiding officer shall report briefly on these actions at the next Chapter meeting.
- 5.2 <u>Composition</u>. The Board of Governors of the Chapter shall consist of the officers, the most recent past president, and three (3) members elected pursuant to Article VII hereof.
- 5.3 <u>Meetings</u>. The time and place of regular meetings of the Board of Governors shall be at the discretion of the Board. A special meeting of the Board of Governors may be called by the President, at his discretion, or at the written request of two (2) members of the Board.
- 5.4 Quorum and Majority Vote. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of a majority of the Board present in person, and the majority vote of the members present in person or by proxy shall be necessary for the adoption of any matter, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws. The form of proxies shall be governed by ARTICLE III, paragraph 3.7 hereof.

- 5.5 <u>Notice of Meetings</u>. Timely written notice of all meetings shall be sent by the Secretary to all members setting forth the place, date and hour of the meeting and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose thereof.
- 5.6 Appointments. The Board of Governors-elect shall appoint members of the Auditing Committee, persuant to paragraph 8.3.6 hereof, at a special meeting of the Board of Governors-elect held prior to the annual meeting of the Chapter. Appointments shall be announced at such annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

- 6.1 <u>Titles.</u> The officers of the Chapter shall be a President, a President-Elect, a Vice President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer.
- 6.2 <u>Multiple Offices</u>. With the exception of the office of President, any number of offices may be held by the same member.
- 6.3 The President. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Chapter and shall have general direction of the affairs of the Chapter and general supervision over its several officers, subject however, to the control of the Board of Governors. He shall, from time to time, report to the members and to the Board, all matters within his knowledge which the interest of the Chapter may require to be brought to the Chapter's notice; shall preside at all meetings of the members and at all meetings of the Board; shall sign and execute in the name of the Chapter all contracts, or other instruments authorized by the Board, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated or permitted by the Board or by these Bylaws to some other officer or agent of the Chapter.
- The President-Elect shall The President-Elect. automatically succeed to the office of the President at the conclusion of the President's term of office. In the absence of the President, the President-Elect shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of the President. In addition, the President-Elect shall make his committee chairmen appointments sufficiently far in advance of the Chapters Regional Conference as to permit attendance by his appointees at CRC workshops in the period prior to appointee's active participation as chairmen of the Chapter Committees. Chairmen designees of such committees as Education, Energy Management, Membership, and Research Promotion should be especially encouraged to attend CRC Prior to the annual meeting, the President-Elect shall complete his appointments by naming at least two (2) committee members to each of the standing committees of the Chapter.

If the President dies, resigns, or is removed from office, the President-Elect shall immediately become President and shall serve for the remainder of the term of his immediate predecessor. If the time served by the President-Elect as President is less than six months, he shall continue to serve as President for the next Society year. If the President-Elect dies, resigns, is removed from office, or becomes President in accordance with the foregoing provisions, the office of President-Elect shall remain vacant until the next annual Chapter elections.

- 6.5 <u>The Vice President.</u> In the absence of the President and the President-Elect, the Vice President shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of the President.
- The Secretary. The Secretary shall send notices of meetings to the members and to the Board of Governors as prescribed in these Bylaws, and to Committee Chairmen as requested by the President. He shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the chapter and of the Board of Governors and shall promptly file a copy of the minutes of each meeting of the chapter with the Secretary of the Society, the Editor of the Society Journal, and the Regional Chairman. He shall send advance notices and minutes of meetings of the Board of Governors to the Regional Chairman. He shall maintain a membership roster, a roll of membership attendance, and such books, papers, and records as the Chapter or Board of Governors may direct, which shall be open to the inspection of any member of the Board of Governors. He shall promptly notify members of their nomination, election, or appointment to office.
- 6.7 The Treasurer. The Treasurer shall receive all funds, including dues, fees, charges, and other assessments and shall deposit such funds in the name of the Chapter in banks or other depositories. He shall disburse funds only as authorized by the Chapter's Board of Governors and shall keep appropriate records of receipts and expenses and shall exhibit such records at all reasonable times to any member of the Board of Governors. The Treasurer shall make a full financial report at the annual meeting of the Chapter, a copy of which shall be forwarded to the Regional Chairman. In addition, in the absence of contrary written instructions from the Society, the Treasurer shall complete, execute and file any statements or returns incidental to federal or local taxation.
- 6.8 Additional Duties. All officers shall perform all duties incident to their respective offices and such other duties as are prescribed by these Bylaws or as are assigned by the Board of Governors.

ARTICLE VII - NOMINATIONS, ELECTIONS, VACANCIES, AND REMOVAL

- 7.1 <u>Eligibility for Re-election</u>. The President shall not be eligible to serve in the same office and the President-Elect shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office for an additional consecutive year.
- 7.2 <u>Duties of Nominating Committee</u>. The Nominating Committee shall select from the members eligible to hold office one candidate for each office except President, and for each member to be elected to the Board of Governors and shall obtain in writing from each candidate a written statement that he is a member in good standing in the Society and consents to stand for election. Not less than thirty (30) days before the March meeting the Nominating Committee shall present to the Secretary the names of the candidates selected, together with their statements.
- 7.3 <u>Duties of Secretary.</u> Upon receipt of these names from the Nominating Committee, the Secretary shall prepare a list of the candidates and shall forward such list to all members with voting rights at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.
- 7.4 Nomination by Members. Additional nominations of members in good standing who consent orally or in writing to be candidates, may be made from the floor at such meeting. If at this meeting more than one such nomination from the floor is made for any one office or membership on the Board of Governors, a vote shall be taken to select the name of the opposition candidate to be placed on the ballot.
- 7.5 Voting and Election. Not less than ten (10) days prior to the next meeting, the Secretary shall send a mail ballot, in the case of elections by mail, or a proxy statement, in the case of elections at meetings, to all members with voting rights. In the case of elections at meetings, the President shall appoint three (3) tellers to assist in conducting the election. The Board of Governors or the tellers, if any, shall promptly tally all votes. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast for each respective office shall be declared elected. If there is a tie vote, there shall be a run-off election.
- 7.6 Installation. Officers and members of the Board of Governors shall be installed and shall assume their duties at the annual meeting of the Chapter, as prescribed in ARTICLE III, paragraph 3.2 hereof, to serve until their successors are installed.

- 7.7 <u>Vacancies</u>. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in any office or on the Board of Governors by resignation or otherwise, the Board of Governors shall have the power to fill such office until the next annual election and installation, and such officer shall have the duties, rights, and privileges of his predecessor.
- 7.8 Removal. Any officer or member of the Board of Governors may be removed by a 2/3 vote of voting members present at a regular meeting, whenever in the judgment of the members, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby. The notice of this Chapter meeting shall contain the statement that an item of importance to the Chapter will be presented for action.

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

- 8.1 <u>General</u>. All Chapter Committees shall be designated as Standing Committees or Special Committees. Standing Committees are mandatory and are of a continuing nature, while Special Committees are created for a specific purpose and may be dissolved when their functions have been completed.
- 8.2 <u>Appointments.</u> Except as noted herein, all Standing Committee members and respective Chairman thereof shall be appointed by the President-Elect pursuant to Article 6.4.
- 8.3 Standing Committees. Standing Committees are mandatory and are broken into two categories: (a) those tied into the CRC and those essential to the Chapter operation. (b) Committees tied into the CRC are the CRC Action, Education, Energy Management, Membership and Research Promotion. (c) Committees essential to the Chapter operation are Auditing, Nominating, Program, Reception, Publicity, Attendance, Publication or Newsletter, and Historical. (d) The duties and functions of each Standing Committee (several of which may be combined under a single chairman) are as follows:
- 8.3.1 CRC Action Committee. The CRC Action Committee shall determine major items of concern to the Chapter, obtain biographies on possible candidates for Society offices. committees and for various Region and Society honors and awards, provide direction to the delegate and alternate delegate on actions to be presented to the Chapter's behalf at the CRC, and encourage the Chairmen of the Membership, Education, Research Promotion, and Energy Management Committees to attend the CRC. The Chairman of this Committee should be a past president of the Chapter.

- 8.3.2 Education Committee. The Education Committee shall encourage the continuing education of the members in the sciences of Heating. Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning; shall, in conjunction with the Program Committee and Research Promotion Committee, arrange for presentations on current developments in these and related sciences; and shall arrange for Chapter participation in continuing education courses and related activities. The Chairman of this Committee, or his designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.3 Energy Management Committee. The Energy Management Committee shall promote the continuing education of the members in energy conservation measures and activities adopted by the Society, and encourage new energy management designs by members, and the submittal of written reports on those designs for consideration in Regional and Society energy awards competition. The Chairman of this Committee, or his designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.4 Membership Committee. The Membership Committee shall encourage applications by persons qualified for membership in the Society; shall encourage increased member participation in Chapter affairs; and shall encourage members to advance in their membership grade in the Society. The Chairman of this Committee, or his designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.5 Research Promotion Committee. The Research Promotion Committee shall promote the research activities of the Society by conducting an annual campaign to obtain investments in ASHRAE Research, and shall encourage original and independent research by the members in the sciences of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning, and in conjunction with the Program Committee, shall encourage lectures, demonstrations and discussions on technical topics of interest for presentation at Chapter meetings. The Chairman of this Committee, or his designated substitute, is required to attend the CRC Meeting and Special Regional Committee Meeting when called by Regional Vice Chairman for Research Promotion.
- 8.3.6 Auditing Committee. The Auditing Committee shall consist of three (3) members, none of whom shall be members of the Board of Governors. The Committee shall be appointed by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.
- 8.3.7 Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five (5) members in good standing, none of whom shall be members of the Board of Governors. The Committee shall be elected by the Chapter at the January meeting. The Nominating Committee shall elect its own chairman. Nominations shall be made by members from the floor at such meeting. Nominees

- receiving the five highest number of votes shall be elected. In the case of a tie, there shall be a runoff election which shall be held at the same meeting.
- 8.3.8 <u>Program Committee</u>. The Program Committee, in conjunction with the Board of Governors and all other committees, shall arrange programs for the meeting of the Chapter.
- 8.3.9 <u>Reception Committee.</u> The Reception Committee shall encourage fellowship among members; and shall extend cordial greetings to guests and new members of the Society.
- 8.3.10 Publicity Committee. The Publicity Committee shall publicize the name, purposes and activities of the Chapter in an effort to obtain qualified members; shall report Chapter activities of public interest to the news media.
- 8.3.11 Attendance Committee. The Attendance Committee shall be responsible for contacting each member of the Chapter prior to each scheduled meeting or event to insure that they have received notice of that meeting or event. and to ascertain the expected attendance.
- 8.3.12 <u>Publications or Newsletter Committee</u>. The Publications Committee shall obtain news of interest to the Chapter members and supervise the publishing of the Chapter newsletter.
- 8.3.13 <u>Historical Committee</u>. The Historical Committee shall collect and safeguard facts, photographs, records and other memorabilia pertinent to the history of the Chapter.
- 8.3.14 <u>Special Events Committee.</u> The Special Events Committee shall handle the arrangements for any special events to be sponsored by the Chapter, or for other events to which the Chapter membership has been invited.
- 8.4 Other Committees. Additional committees shall be termed as Special Committees and may be appointed at any time by the President, with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors, and shall be announced at the next meeting of the Chapter.
- Note: Chapters shall submit the list and duties of known Special Committees. (See Rules of the Board 300-005-001.)
- 8.5 <u>Vacancies</u>. Whenever any member refuses an appointment to a committee or whenever there is a vacancy on any committee by resignation or otherwise, the President shall, with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors, appoint another member to such committee.

- 8.6 Removal. Any committee member appointed or elected may be removed by the person or persons authorized to appoint or elect such member, whenever, in their judgment, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby, except that the President shall remove a member only with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors.
- 8.7 <u>Attendance at Board Meetings.</u> Committee Chairman shall attend the meetings of the Board of Governors when so requested by the presiding officer, but shall not be entitled to voting rights at such meetings.

ARTICLE IX - CHAPTERS REGIONAL COMMITTEE

- 9.1 Election of Delegates. The Board of Governors-elect shall elect from among its members one delegate and one alternate to the Chapter Regional Committee. At least one of said delegates shall be an officer-elect of the Chapter. The delegates shall be announced at the annual meeting of the Chapter. The names of such delegate shall be certified in writing by the Secretary to the Secretary of the Society and the Regional Chairman by the first day of the following June.
- 9.2 Term. The delegate and alternate delegate shall serve for a term of one (1) year, commencing on the first day of June following their election. No member may be elected to serve as the delegate for more than two (2) consecutive terms; no member may be elected to serve as the alternate delegate for more than two (2) consecutive terms; and no member may be elected to serve in either capacity for more than four (4) consecutive terms.
- 9.3 <u>Duties</u>. The duties of the delegate and alternate delegate shall be as prescribed from time to time by the Society. They shall transmit recommendations concerning policies, procedures, and operations of the Society, its Chapter and its Student Branches to the Regional Chairman in advance of the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting; shall attend such meeting; shall suggest candidates for the Board of Directors of the Society, Society committees, and miscellaneous Society honors and awards; shall participate in the election of one (1) member and one (1) alternate member to serve on the Society Nominating Committee; and shall report to the Board of Governors of the Chapter regarding the business transacted at the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting, together with any recommendations for Chapter action.
- 9.4 <u>Vacancies and Removal.</u> Whenever either delegate is unable to fulfill his office, the Board of Governors shall appoint another delegate. Either delegate may be removed by the Board of Governors, whenever, in its judgement, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- 10.1 Powers and Limitations. All Articles of these Bylaws shall be subject to alteration or repeal, consistent with the Certificate of Consolidation, Bylaws, and Rules of the Board of Directors of the Society Section 149 (1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act of 1971, as amended, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- 10.2 By Society. Amendments to these Bylaws set forth in written directives of the Secretary of the Society may be adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of said amendments shall be sent by the Secretary to all members, or an officer of the Chapter shall read said amendments at the next succeeding meeting.
- 10.3 By Chapter. Amendments to these Bylaws may also be initiated by a wrtten resolution of a majority of the Board of Governors or of not less than five (5) members in good standing with voting privileges, presented at any meeting of the Chapter. If approved by a majority of the members present the Secretary shall mail copies of the proposed amendments to all members not less than seven (7) days before the next succeeding meeting. If approval by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at such meeting, the Secretary shall forward such amendments to the Secretary of the Society for approval by the Charter and Bylaws Committee of the Society, and review by the Regional Chairman. Any amendments shall become effective only upon receipt of written notice of approval by the Charter and Bylaws Committee of the Society.

ARTICLE XI - ADOPTION

These Bylaws shall be completed and adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of said Bylaws shall be sent by the Secretary to all members and shall be sent, as amended, to such persons as shall, from time to time, become members of the Chapter.

We have received a copy of your February 2 letter to Ralph Smith Vice-President I.E.S. in which you discussed the I.E.S./ASHRAE showcase in Saint-John on Novamber 1, 1983.

The letter was tabled at our executive meeting of February 14 and needless to say, we were <u>very disatisfied</u> with I.E.S. unilateral decision to withold \$1000 from our share of the proceeds from the showcase profits. This, to our opinion, is considered as a very non professional act which destroys any good relation between our societies.

BOILER PLANT IMPROVEMENT SEMINAR

DATE HELD: Thursday & Friday, March 17-18, 1988

LOCATION: Saint John Trade and Convention Centre

INTRODUCTION

Imported oil supplies 46% of New Brunswick's energy requirements. 21,695,000 barrels of petroleum were imported in 1985; 70% from Venezuela and Mexico; and 30% western oil shipped in tankers from Montreal. The province has no protection against shortages and high prices which could very quickly result from a slightly increased world demand, a reorganized OPEC, or international disruptions. Conservation efforts and efficiency improvements are the best means of lessening the effects of these outside influences on the provincial economy.

OBJECTIVE

The objective is to present current information on measuring and improving the efficiency of boilers and systems using steam. This will be done with presentations on available practices and techniques for conserving energy through elimination of waste in boilers and water heating systems, and with a demonstration of the indirect test procedure for boiler efficiency.

It is expected that the participants could achieve an average boiler efficiency improvement of 6% without capital expenditure which would result in a saving of approximately \$150,000/year for a 50,000 lbs./hr. boiler. Larger savings are often economically feasible with small investments in equipment. Improvements in the efficiency of systems using steam are often much greater than those associated with the boiler.

BACKGROUND

The Boiler Efficiency Institute in Auburn, Alabama, has been presenting workshops and performing field studies on boiler and steam efficiency improvement since the seventies. The lecturers are known for their teaching style which combines a sound technical presentation with an easy to understand approach which has an equally strong appeal to all individuals interested in boiler and steam efficiency, regardless of their educational experience and background.

This two-day seminar was presented in Montreal and Toronto in September, 1987. A New Brunswick consultant who attended the seminar in Montreal indicated that it was very good. Also, the person responsible for the Toronto seminar indicated the Ministry of Energy was very satisfied with the course content and presentation, and they have held the seminar once each year for the last five years.

The N.B. Chapter of ASHRAE, therefore decided that a similar seminar in New Brunswick would be very beneficial to the operators of boilers in hospitals, colleges, universities, pulp mills, processing plants, large schools, etc.

LOCATION

The seminar was held at the Saint John Trade and Convention Centre with accommodations for the participants arranged at the Hilton International Saint John. These are a part of the new Market Square Complex located on the Saint John harbourfront. This made for a very beautiful and enjoyable setting for the seminar. The field demonstration on the morning of Day 2 was held at Moosehead Breweries Ltd. in Saint John. Two city buses were chartered to transport the group to and from the demonstration.

PROCEEDINGS

The seminar was opened by Mr. Graham Fawcett, Education Committee Chairman for the N.B. Chapter of ASHRAE. He welcomed the participants and introduced Mr. John Hutchinson, Director of the N.B. CREO of Energy, Mines and Resources Canada. Mr. Hutchinson illustrated the importance of fuel efficient plant operations and the important role that the operators have in this effort.

The lecturers for the seminar were then introduced. Dr. David Dyer of the Boiler Efficiency Institute, presented the entire classroom session and the water quality portion of the field demonstration. David Burch of the Boiler Efficiency Institute, set up the field demonstrations and presented the combustion efficiency testing.

The topics covered are summarized in Appendix II. The overhead transparencies from the lectures were gathered and a set of copies made for each of the attendees. A copy is included with this report.

Dr. Dyer has an excellent style of presentation. He requires no reference materials and is able to make notes on the overhead transparencies as he goes. That he is very knowledgeable and comfortable in this field, is obvious. He quickly establishes a rapport with his audience, and will frequently get the audience to add relevant information about their situations. The atmosphere is at once relaxed and enthusiastic, very conducive to learning. The occasional humourous remark helped to keep the presentation enjoyable. People weren't watching the clock, and it seemed that nobody wanted to leave early, even on the final afternoon.

The field demonstration at Moosehead Breweries consisted of three areas; the water quality testing, the combustion efficiency testing, and a tour of the brewing and bottling operations. A half hour was allotted for each area. The class was divided into three groups as they filed through the front door. The first group of 25 was taken directly to the boiler room for the combustion efficiency testing. The second group of 25 was taken on the tour, and the third group was taken to the water quality demonstration. After each thirty minutes the groups were

rotated to another area of the demonstration. In this way each group saw each area in the space of an hour and a half with a minimum of confusion and frustration.

A film crew from CHSJ TV, the CBC affiliate for New Brunswick, was present during the field demonstration to do a news article about the Boiler Plant Improvement Seminar. This aired later that day on the 5:30 P.M. and 11:00 P.M. CBC News for New Brunswick. Lasting about four minutes, it included a narrative by the anchorman, some film of the group and Dr. Dyer at the water quality demonstration, an interview with Alan Miller of E.M.R. Canada's N.B. CREO, and one with Richard Jackson of Moosehead Breweries. The news article emphasized the savings the boiler technicians could achieve for their respective companies, and shed a positive light on the efforts of E.M.R. Canada and ASHRAE (N.B.).

Following the afternoon session on Day 2, closing remarks were presented by Alan Miller. Gifts to the lecturers were presented by Richard Jackson. Before leaving, an evaluation questionnaire was completed by each of the attendees. The results of this questionnaire are summarized in Appendix III. Before leaving, many stopped to enquire with EMR Canada staff about upcoming courses and seminars.

DISCUSSION

Each of the participants seemed very pleased with the seminar. Some improvements which will be added to future seminars of this type include:

- 1. Course Materials All course materials will be received by organizers well in advance of future seminars. One of three boxes of manuals for this seminar was lost by the airlines. This was not a serious problem as the manuals were not required during the seminar, and replacements were received within a week and sent to the participants.
- 2. Smoking The classroom will be divided into smoking and non-smoking areas, with due regard to air flow in the classroom.
- 3. Classroom Size This seminar was originally planned for a maximum of 50, but due to demand, was increased to 75. Because of this, an adjoining room had to be added, making the seminar room a bit long.
- 4. Organizers will wear distinctive name tags so that participants will know who to go to for information.

The service provided by the hotel and convention centre staff was excellent. Coffee and muffins were provided at each break. The noon luncheons were excellent. The "Royal Suite" was provided as a hospitality room during the evening of Day 1. Nearly half of the seminar participants took advantage of this chance to meet one another and the lecturers.

COST

Costs for the seminar were expected to total \$14,000 with a revenue from 30 paid participants of \$1,500 for a net cost of \$12,500. Because of the very high demand, the number of paid participants was increased to 73 which increased revenue by \$2,150. The costs remained under the estimated \$14,000 for a net cost of slightly under \$10,000. This amount could very quickly be saved by one plant alone through reduced energy consumption as a result of this seminar.

CONCLUSION

The course was very successful in all aspects. The participants will return to their plants with a fresh outlook on their tasks, a rekindled interest in improving the efficiency of their boiler plants, and perhaps the confidence to challenge the "status quo" where changes should be made.

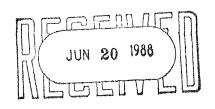

BYLAWS OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK CHAPTER OF THE

AMERICAN SOCIETY OF HEATING, REFRIGERATING AND AIR-CONDITIONING ENGINEERS, INC.

APPROVED BY THE SOCIETY: November 3, 1983

Updated FEBRUARY, 20 , 19889

ARTICLE I - GOVERNMENT

- 1.1 Governing Instruments. The New Brunswick Chapter (herein "Chapter") of the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers, Inc. (herein "Society") shall be governed by its Constitution and these Bylaws, to the extent not inconsistent with the Certificate of Consolidation, Bylaws, and Rules of the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 1.2 <u>Interpretation</u>. The Board of Governors shall resolve all questions of interpretation of the Constitution and these Bylaws.
- 1.3 Rules of Order. Except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws, the conduct of meetings of the members shall be governed by the rules of procedure set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order," as revised.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

- 2.1 Qualification. The membership of the Chapter shall consist of all members of the Society in good standing and residing in the geographic area of the Chapter, as prescribed by the Board of Directors of the Society.
- 2.2 <u>Non-Residents</u>. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a member of the Society residing in the geographic area of a Chapter may elect to be a member of another Chapter. A member may elect to belong to more than one Chapter.
- 2.3 Grade. Each member shall hold the same grade of membership in the Chapter as in the Society.
- 2.4 Rights and Privileges. All Chapter members shall be entitled to the same rights and privileges, except that (a) Affiliates, (b) Student Members, and (c) members who have not paid Chapter fees, dues, assessments or other charges within sixty (60) days of their due date shall not be entitled to voting privileges or the right to election or appointment as an officer, governor, or committee chairman of the Chapter. All rights and privileges of a member are vested solely in the member and may not be delegated or transferred, except as provided in Article III, paragraph 3.7 hereof.

- 2.5 <u>Suspension</u>. In the event that a member does not pay all the Chapter fees, dues, assessments or other charges within six (6) months of their due date, all rights and privileges of membership in the Chapter shall be suspended. Such membership rights and privileges shall be restored to the member upon full payment thereof. Delinquency in payment of Chapter dues or other Chapter charges will not affect a member's standing in the Society.
- 2.6 Termination. Membership in the Chapter shall terminate upon the death of any member, the removal of a member's principal place of residence to the geographic area of another Chapter except as provided in Article II, paragraph 2.2 hereof, or the receipt of written notice by the member of termination of membership. In the event of such termination, neither the former member, nor his/her personal representatives, heirs or devisees shall have any right, title or interest in the Chapter or its assets.
- 2.7 Expulsion. A member may be expelled from the Society and the Chapter only upon action taken by the Board of Directors of the Society. Such action may be initiated by the Board of Governors of the Chapter by the filing of written charges and supporting evidence with the Secretary of the Society.

ARTICLE III - MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

- 3.1 Regular Meetings. Meetings of the Chapter shall be held on at least a monthly basis from September through June at such time and place as is prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 3.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the chapter for the installation of officers and the Board of Governors and the announcement of committee appointments shall be held in the month of May at such time and place as is prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 3.3 <u>Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the Chapter may be called by the President at the President's discretion, or at the request of the Board of Governors or 15 percent of the members with voting rights.
- 3.4 Notice of Meetings. Timely written notice of all meetings shall be sent by the Secretary to all members setting forth the place, date and hour of the meeting and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose thereof.
- 3.5 Quorum. A quorum for the transaction of business at a meeting of the Chapter shall consist of 15 percent of the members having voting rights, except that no business may be transacted unless a majority of the Board of Governors is also in attendance.

- 3.6 Majority Vote. A majority of the number of votes cast in person or by proxy shall be necessary for the adoption of any matter, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws.
- 3.7 Proxies. A member may vote on any matter by a written proxy executed and dated by the member. No proxy shall be valid after ninety (90) days from the date of its execution, unless otherwise provided in the proxy.

ARTICLE IV - DUES AND FINANCE

- 4.1 Society Dues. The annual dues for membership in the Society, as prescribed from time to time by the Society, shall be paid to the Society.
- 4.2 <u>Chapter Dues</u>. The Board of Governors, in its discretion and subject to the approval by a vote of members, may levy such dues, fees, charges or other assessments as are reasonable and necessary to meet the current operating expenses of the Chapter. The due date of such payments shall be as prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- 4.3 Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Chapter shall end on June 30th of each year.

ARTICLE V - BOARD OF GOVERNORS

- 5.1 <u>Duties</u>. The property and affairs of the Chapter shall be managed by the Board of Governors. The Board of Governors may execute all business of the Chapter that does not require action by the full membership of the Chapter. The presiding officer shall report briefly on these actions at the next Chapter meeting.
- 5.2 <u>Composition</u>. The Board of Governors of the Chapter shall consist of the officers, the most recent past president, and three (3) members elected pursuant to Article VII hereof.
- 5.3 <u>Meetings</u>. The time and place of regular meetings of the Board of Governors shall be at the discretion of the Board. A special meeting of the Board of Governors may be called by the President, at the President's discretion, or at the written request of two (2) members of the Board.
- 5.4 Quorum and Majority Vote. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of a majority of the Board present in person, and the majority vote of the members present in person or by proxy shall be necessary for the adoption of any matter, except as otherwise provided in the Constitution or these Bylaws. The form of proxies shall be governed by Article III, paragraph 3.7 hereof.

- 5.5 Notice of Meetings. Timely written notice of all meetings shall be sent by the Secretary to all members setting forth the place, date and hour of the meeting and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose thereof.
- 5.6 Appointments to Auditing Committee. The Board of Governors-elect shall appoint members to the Auditing Committee, pursuant to paragraph 8.3.6 hereof, at a special meeting of the Board of Governors-elect held prior to the annual meeting of the Chapter. Appointments shall be announced at such annual meeting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

- 6.1 <u>Titles</u>. The officers of the Chapter shall be a President, a President-Elect, a Secretary and a Treasurer.
- 6.2 <u>Multiple Offices</u>. With the exception of the office of President, any number of offices may be held by the same member.
- officer of the Chapter and shall have general direction of the affairs of the Chapter and general supervision over its several officers, subject however, to the control of the Board of Governors. The President shall, from time to time, report to the members and to the Board all matters within the President's knowledge which the interest of the Chapter may require to be brought to the Chapter's notice; shall preside at all meetings of the members and at all meetings of the Board; shall sign and execute in the name of the Chapter all contracts, or other instruments authorized by the Board, except in cases where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated or permitted by the Board or by these Bylaws to some other officer or agent of the Chapter.
- 6.4 The President-Elect. The President-Elect shall automatically succeed to the office of the President at the conclusion of the President's term of office. In the absence of the President, the President-Elect shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of the President. In addition, the President-Elect shall make the committee chairmen appointments sufficiently far in advance of the Chapters Regional Conference as to permit attendance by the appointees at CRC workshops in the period prior to appointee's active participation as chairmen of the Chapter Committees. Chairmen designees of such committees as Education and Chapter Programs, Energy and Technical Affairs, Membership Promotion, and Research Promotion should be especially encouraged to attend CRC meetings. Prior to the annual meeting, the President-Elect shall complete the appointments by naming at least two (2) committee members to each of the standing committees of the Chapter.

If the President dies, resigns, or is removed from office, the President-Elect shall immediately become President and shall serve for the remainder of the term of the immediate predecessor. If the time served by the President-Elect as President is less than six months, he/she shall continue to serve as President for the next Society year; therefore the office of President-Elect shall remain vacant until the next annual chapter election. If the President-Elect dies, resigns, is removed from office, or becomes President for more than six months in accordance with the foregoing provisions, a special election shall be held to fill the vacancy.

- 6.5 The Secretary. The Secretary shall send notices of meetings to the members and to the Board of Governors as prescribed in these Bylaws, and to Committee Chairmen as requested by the President. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Chapter and of the Board of Governors and shall promptly file a copy of the minutes of each meeting of the Chapter with the Secretary of the Society, the Editor of the Society Journal, and the Regional Chairman, and shall send advance notices and minutes of meetings of the Board of Governors to the Regional Chairman. The Secretary shall maintain a membership roster, a roll of membership attendance, and such books, papers, and records as the Chapter or Board of Governors may direct, which shall be open to the inspection of any member of the Board of Governors. The Secretary shall promptly notify members of their nomination, election, or appointment to office.
- 6.6 The Treasurer. The Treasurer shall receive all funds, including dues, fees, charges and other assessments, and shall deposit such funds in the name of the Chapter in banks or other depositories. The Treasurer shall disburse funds only as authorized by the Chapter's Board of Governors and shall keep appropriate records of receipts and expenses and shall exhibit such records at all reasonable times to any member of the Board of Governors. The Treasurer shall make a full financial report at the annual meeting of the Chapter, a copy of which shall be forwarded to the Regional Chairman. In addition, in the absence of contrary written instructions from the Society, the Treasurer shall complete, execute and file any statements or returns incidental to federal or local taxation.
- 6.7 Additional Duties. All officers shall perform all duties incident to their respective offices and such other duties as are prescribed by these Bylaws or as are assigned by the Board of Governors.

ARTICLE VII - NOMINATIONS, ELECTIONS, VACANCIES, AND REMOVAL

- 7.1 Eligibility for Re-election. Officers and Board members are elected for one-year terms, but may be re-elected to consecutive terms. The president may be re-elected to the same office for one additional consecutive term. If the president is re-elected for an additional consecutive term, the president-elect will also need to be re-elected in accordance with the election procedure set forth in Section VII.
- 7.2 Duties of Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall select from the members eligible to hold office one candidate for each office except President, and for each member to be elected to the Board of Governors and shall obtain from each candidate a written statement that the candidate is a member in good standing in the Society and consents to stand for election. Not less than thirty (30) days before the March meeting the Nominating Committee shall present to the Secretary the names of the candidates selected, together with their statements.
- 7.3 <u>Duties of Secretary</u>. Upon receipt of these names from the Nominating Committee, the Secretary shall prepare a list of the candidates and shall forward such list to all members with voting rights at least ten (10) days prior to such meeting.
- 7.4 Nomination by Members. Additional nominations of members in good standing who consent orally or in writing to be candidates, may be made from the floor at such meeting. If at this meeting more than one such nomination from the floor is made for any one office or membership on the Board of Governors, a vote shall be taken to select the name of the opposition candidate to be placed on the ballot.
- 7.5 Voting and Election. Not less than ten (10) days prior to the next meeting, the Secretary shall send a mail ballot, in the case of elections by mail, or a proxy statement, in the case of elections at meetings, to all members with voting rights. In the case of elections at meetings, the President shall appoint three (3) tellers to assist in conducting the election. The Board of Governors or the tellers, if any, shall promptly tally all votes. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast for each respective office shall be declared elected. If there is a tie vote, there shall be a run-off election.
- 7.6 <u>Installation</u>. Officers and members of the Board of Governors shall be installed and shall assume their duties at the annual meeting of the Chapter, as prescribed in Article III, paragraph 3.2 hereof, to serve until their successors are installed.

- 7.7 <u>Vacancies</u>. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in any office or on the Board of Governors by resignation or otherwise, except in the office of President-Elect, the Board of Governors shall have the power to fill such office until the next annual election and installation, and such officer shall have the duties, rights, and privileges of the predecessor. A vacancy in the office of President-Elect shall be handled in accordance with Article VI, paragraph 6.4.
- 7.8 Removal. Any officer or member of the Board of Governors may be removed by a 2/3 vote of voting members present at a regular meeting, whenever in the judgment of the members, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby. The notice of this Chapter meeting shall contain the statement that an item of importance to the Chapter will be presented for action.

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

- 8.1 General. All Chapter Committees shall be designated as Standing Committees or Special Committees. Standing Committees are mandatory and are of a continuing nature, while Special Committees are created for a specific purpose and may be dissolved when their functions have been completed.
- 8.2 Appointments. Except as noted herein, all Standing Committee members and respective Chairmen thereof shall be appointed by the President-Elect pursuant to Article 6.4.
- 8.3 <u>Standing Committees</u>. Standing Committees are mandatory and are broken into two categories: those tied into the CRC and those essential to the Chapter operation. (a) Committees tied into the CRC are the CRC Action, Education and Chapter Programs, Energy and Technical Affairs, Membership Promotion, and Research Promotion. (b) Committees essential to the Chapter operation are Auditing, Nominating, Program, Reception, Publicity, Attendance, Publication or Newsletter, and Historical. The duties and functions of each Standing Committee (several of which may be combined under a single chairman) are as follows:
- 8.3.1 CRC Action Committee. The CRC Action Committee shall determine major items of concern to the Chapter, obtain biographies on possible candidates for Society offices, committees and for various Regional and Society honors and awards, provide direction to the delegate and alternate delegate on actions to be presented on the Chapter's behalf at the CRC, and encourage the Chairmen of the Education and Chapter Programs, Energy and Technical Affairs, Membership Promotion, and Research Promotion Committees to attend the CRC. The Chairman of this Committee should be a past president of the Chapter.

- 8.3.2 Education and Chapter Programs Committee. The Education and Chapter Programs Committee shall encourage the continuing education of the members in the sciences of heating, refrigeration and air-conditioning; shall, in conjunction with the Program Committee and Research Promotion Committee, arrange for presentations on current developments in these and related sciences; and shall arrange for Chapter participation in continuing education courses and related activities. The Chairman of this Committee, or a designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.3 Energy and Technical Affairs Committee. The Energy and Technical Affairs Committee shall promote the continuing education of the members in energy conservation measures and activities adopted by the Society, and encourage new energy management designs by members, and the submittal of written reports on those designs for consideration in Regional and Society energy awards competition. The Chairman of this Committee, or a designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.4 Membership Promotion Committee. The Membership Promotion Committee shall encourage applications by persons qualified for membership in the Society; shall encourage increased member participation in Chapter affairs; and shall encourage members to advance in their membership grade in the Society. The Chairman of this Committee, or a designated substitute, is expected to attend the CRC Meeting.
- 8.3.5 Research Promotion Committee. The Research Promotion Committee shall promote the research activities of the Society by conducting an annual campaign to obtain investments in ASHRAE Research, and shall encourage original and independent research by the members in the sciences of heating, refrigeration and air-conditioning, and in conjunction with the Program Committee, shall encourage lectures, demonstrations and discussions on technical topics of interest for presentation at Chapter meetings. The Chairman of this Committee, or a designated substitute, is required to attend the CRC Meeting and Special Regional Committee Meeting when called by Regional Vice Chairman for Research Promotion.
- 8.3.6 Auditing Committee. The Auditing Committee shall consist of three (3) members, none of whom shall be members of the Board of Governors. The Committee shall be appointed by the Board and shall elect its own chairman.
- 8.3.7 Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five (5) members in good standing. One member of the Board of Governors may serve on the Nominating Committee, but not as its chairman. The Committee shall be elected by the Chapter at the January meeting. At the preceding meeting, the Board of Governors shall submit to the members their nominations for the committee. Additional nominations may be made by members from the floor at said meeting. Nominees receiving the five highest number of votes shall

- be elected. In the case of a tie, there shall be a runoff election which shall be held at the same meeting. The Nominating Committee shall elect its own chairman.
- 8.3.8 <u>Program Committee</u>. The Program Committee, in conjunction with the Board of Governors and all other committees, shall arrange programs for the meeting of the Chapter.
- 8.3.9 Reception Committee. The Reception Committee shall encourage fellowship among members; and shall extend cordial greetings to guests and new members of the Society.
- 8.3.10 Publicity Committee. The Publicity Committee shall publicize the name, purposes and activities of the Chapter in an effort to obtain qualified members; shall report Chapter activities of public interest to the news media.
- 8.3.11 Attendance Committee. The Attendance Committee shall be responsible for contacting each member of the Chapter prior to each scheduled meeting or event to ensure that they have received notice of that meeting or event, and to ascertain the expected attendance.
- 8.3.12 <u>Publications or Newsletter Committee</u>. The Publications Committee shall obtain news of interest to the Chapter members and supervise the publishing of the Chapter newsletter.
- 8.3.13 <u>Historical Committee</u>. The Historical Committee shall collect and safeguard facts, photographs, records and other memorabilia pertinent to the history of the Chapter.
- 8.3.14 Special Events Committee. The Special Events Committee shall handle the arrangements for any special events to be sponsored by the Chapter, or for other events to which the Chapter membership has been invited.
- 8.4 Other Committees. Additional committees shall be termed as Special Committees and may be appointed at any time by the President, with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors, and shall be announced at the next meeting of the Chapter.
- 8.5 <u>Vacancies</u>. Whenever any member refuses an appointment to a committee or whenever there is a vacancy on any committee by resignation or otherwise, the President shall, with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors, appoint another member to such committee.
- 8.6 Removal. Any committee member appointed or elected may be removed by the person or persons authorized to appoint or elect such member whenever, in their judgment, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby, except that the President shall remove a member only with the advice and approval of the Board of Governors.

8.7 Attendance at Board Meetings. Committee Chairmen shall attend the meetings of the Board of Governors when so requested by the presiding officer, but shall not be entitled to voting rights at such meetings.

ARTICLE IX - CHAPTERS REGIONAL COMMITTEE

- 9.1 Election of Delegates. The Board of Governors-elect shall elect from among its members one delegate and one alternate to the Chapter Regional Committee. At least one of said delegates shall be an officer-elect of the Chapter. The delegates shall be announced at the annual meeting of the Chapter. The names of such delegates shall be certified in writing by the Secretary to the Secretary of the Society and the Regional Chairman by the first day of the following June.
- 9.2 Term. The delegate and alternate delegate shall serve for a term of one (1) year, commencing on the first day of June following their election. No member may be elected to serve as the delegate for more than two (2) consecutive terms; no member may be elected to serve as the alternate delegate for more than two (2) consecutive terms; and no member may be elected to serve in either capacity for more than four (4) consecutive terms.
- 9.3 <u>Duties</u>. The duties of the delegate and alternate delegate shall be as prescribed from time to time by the Society. They shall transmit recommendations concerning policies, procedures, and operations of the Society, its Chapter and its Student Branches to the Regional Chairman in advance of the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting; shall attend such meeting; shall suggest candidates for the Board of Directors of the Society, Society committees, and miscellaneous Society honors and awards; shall participate in the election of one (1) member and one (1) alternate member to serve on the Society Nominating Committee; and shall report to the Board of Governors of the Chapter regarding the business transacted at the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting, together with any recommendations for Chapter action.
- 9.4 <u>Vacancies and Removal</u>. Whenever either delegate is unable to fulfill this office, the Board of Governors shall appoint another delegate. Either delegate may be removed by the Board of Governors whenever, in its judgement, the best interests of the Chapter will be served thereby.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

- 10.1 Powers and Limitations. All Articles of these Bylaws shall be subject to alteration or repeal, consistent with the Certificate of Consolidation, Bylaws, and Rules of the Board of Directors of the Society and Section 149 (1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act of 1971, as amended, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- 10.2 By Society. Amendments to these Bylaws set forth in written directives of the Secretary of the Society may be adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of said amendments shall be sent by the Secretary to all members, or an officer of the Chapter shall read said amendments at the next succeeding meeting.
- 10.3 By Chapter. Amendments to these Bylaws may also be initiated by a written resolution of a majority of the Board of Governors or of not less than five (5) members in good standing with voting privileges, presented at any meeting of the Chapter. If approved by a majority of the members present, the Secretary shall mail copies of the proposed amendments to all members not less than seven (7) days before the next succeeding meeting. If approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at such meeting, the Secretary shall forward such amendments to the Secretary of the Society for approval by the Charter and Bylaws Committee of the Society, and review by the Regional Chairman. Any amendments shall become effective only upon receipt of written notice of approval by the Charter and Bylaws Committee of the Society.

ARTICLE XI - ADOPTION

These Bylaws shall be completed and adopted by a majority of the Board of Governors. Written copies of said Bylaws shall be sent by the Secretary to all members and shall be sent, as amended, to such persons as shall, from time to time, become members of the Chapter.

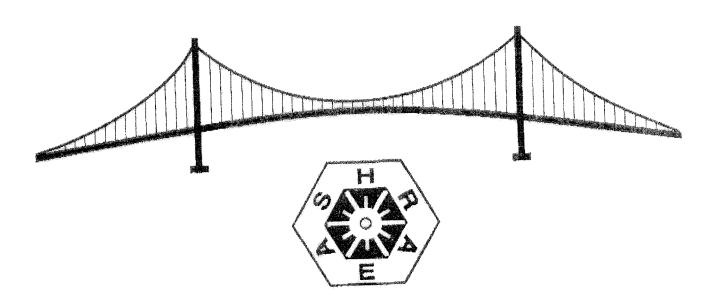

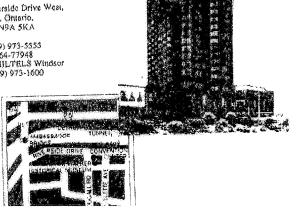

Steve - Further to our discussions yesterday, here is a summary of the accomplishments of the TEGA Committee over this past ASHRAE season.

- "TEGA NOTES" started on November 30, 1996 with a fax to Laurier Nichols, the RVC for this committee. This transmission included details on TEGA activity to date (Jan. 9, 1996).
- Made some excellent contacts within DSS and the EMTF as listed in TEGA NOTES.
- January 18, our first PAOE submission of the season, for 200 points. Gerry W. gave a technical seminar on Humidifiers for DSS and the afternoon session for ASHRAE (100 pts total), and I gave a seminar at the CEC '95 for APENB and EMTF (50 pts.). Also, I set myself up as a liaison to Gov't, and was appointed to the EMTF for 25 points each.
- Attempt was made to encourage the Edmundston Regional Hospital to apply for the ASHRAE energy rewards, but in the end, this was not possible.
- April 8, 1996 was the next application for PAOE points, which we achieved 325 points. I received 100 pts for two technical seminars. Alvre Gallant got us 50 pts for appointments to boards: CFC Steering Committee, and the Program Advisory Committee for the Refin Trade, I also received 25 pts for being a liaison to EMTF. I also set myself up as a liaison to all listed contacts in DSS in Fredericton for 150 pts.
- Energian attempted to have a submission ready for the ASHRAE energy awards, but time would not allow for this submittal. This is now slated for a submission for next vear.

This represents the summary of the TEGA outreach activities for this year. I look forward to a more productive year for 96/97.

We are satisfied that this year we have tried our best. However, we did not achieve all of our objectives.

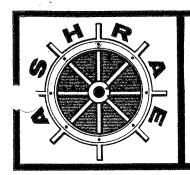

Our Chapter has continued its re-building process this year in an effort to bring the membership back to our meetings. Although Chapter membership numbers do not reflect a significant change, participation in chapter activities continues to improve in keeping with last year's revival.

1 Campaign Goals

The 96/97 RP Campaign had a chapter goal of \$5000 based on previous contributors and the optimistic attitude of the chairman. The Challenge goal was set at \$4875 with a High Five objective of \$3780.

The Campaign

The campaign began very slowly with new promotions only starting Dec/96. Approximately \$1200 had been collected late in the 95/96 campaign and was assigned to the 96/97 campaign. The fall collected nearly another \$1200 by the end of the year.

The campaign began to build momentum by Feb/97 and the collections were very good. The campaign came up short of the Chapter goal due to no contribution from past large contributors who had given \$1000 to previous campaigns.

The letter campaign was followed by a series of two personal phone calls to the CEO's of those firms or associations that were good past contributors. This approach collected approximately \$1420 and required several calls to be made to gain the attention of the CEO's.

3 The Results

The non-official final results of the 96/97 campaign should be \$3793.08. This amount exceeds the requirement for the High Five Award. The last of three reports to the Research Promotion RVC was sent July 2, 1997 and was for an amount of \$320. All Cheques and form work was sent to the Atlanta Headquarters on the same dates as the RVC Reports (copies attached).

Recommendations

The large contributors are very difficult to maintain as return supporters of ASHRAE Research. Chapters should assign individuals who have had success with large contributors to that company as a dedicated RP liason to only that contributor. The contributor would be given monthly reports, ongoing research activity and excepts from info that is sent to the RP Chairman. As such, the large contributor would be given the additional attention that their large contribution deserves.

As well, the Atlanta Headquarters could provide additional letters of promotion, signed authentically by the President of ASHRAE (not a form letter).

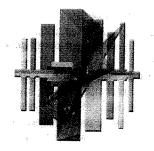
Geothermal System for Prison

he design team for the Nova Institution, a new Canadian federal women's correctional facility located in Truro, Nova Scotia, faced several challenges. Correctional Service Canada (CSC), the federal government department in charge of the facility, wanted to make this project the first constructed by their department to meet the Institutional Green Plan as part of Canada's Environmental Stewardship program.

As design of the project began, the engineers were challenged by the stringent emissions and energy consumption targets imposed by the program. Building construction needed to meet both R2000 and C2000 standards. The design for the complex consisted of four two-story and one single-story residen-

tial units, a gymnasium, recreation center, training facilities, offices, service facilities, and a high-security cellblock. Given the significant design constraints, the design team realized that a detailed engineering analysis was needed to determine the most effective system for heating and cooling requirements.

Project Design and Controls

The engineering team had several options. Electric resistance heating was immediately eliminated because of its high overall CO₂ generation from the fossil fuels used for local power generation.

The team considered a central plant with fuel-fired boilers or a combustion engine co-generation plant, but the distribution system was costly and there was insufficient demand for the waste heat from a co-generation unit during the summer.

Because the complex was not entirely air conditioned, the use of an absorption chiller was not feasible for such a purpose. The remaining alternatives included propane gas appliances with air-cooled R-22 air conditioning or geothermal heat pumps. Initially, it was not known if either of these two systems would meet the CSC's energy target, but the geothermal application provided the best possibility. In addition, the geothermal heat pump permits future additions of low grade heat from other sources, such as solar energy, that could increase the COP of the heat

pumps, and ultimately help meet the energy efficiency targets.

Site testing was performed prior to the system's design to determine the quantity of ground water available for a water source system. Because insufficient quantities were found, the team decided to install a closed loop geothermal piping system. This included a combination of horizontally buried piping, and vertical piping in bore holes, installed around the perimeter of the site. To minimize the pumping power requirements and increase heat transfer capacity for the ground loop, the diameter of the polyethylene pipe was increased to 11/4 in. (32 mm) from the typical ¾ in. (19 mm).

More than 28,000 ft (8530 m) of pipe was installed in two separate loops that consisted of two pipes per loop. These alternate from bore hole to heat pump buffer tank, with both loops run in the same trench. As a result, the pumping requirements were reduced to a 1.5 hp (1.1 kW) pump circulating 10 gpm (0.76 L/s) of fluid through each loop.

A building management system (BMS) monitors the temperature in each primary buffer tank so that if the setpoint is satisfied, the loop circulator will shut down. The loop also is used to pick up any heat rejected from kitchen coolers and freezers.

Design of the loop was based on 250 ft (70 m) of two horizontal pipes per ton of heat pump capacity, and 150 ft/ton (46 m/ton) for bore holes. Where cooling takes place, the bore hole length was increased to 175 ft/ton (53 m/ton).

During the summer, fluid is circulated directly from the primary loop buffer tanks to fan-coil units to provide cooling to administrative and program areas without the use of mechanical refrigeration.

Twenty-one water-to-water heat pumps were installed in mechanical rooms around the complex. The heat pumps were custom built by a local manufacturer and tested to CSA 446 Standards. These three-stage, two compressor units are controlled by the BMS to accurately maintain water temperature in the secondary buffer tank. The water temperature is varied inversely with outdoor temperature with fine-tuning of the reset curve based upon space temperature feedback. High-efficiency propane-fired

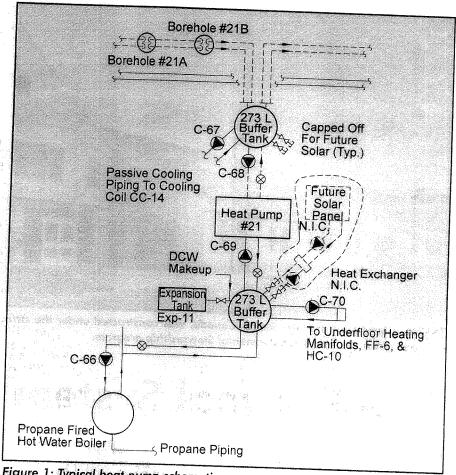


Figure 1: Typical heat pump schematic.

domestic hot water tanks provide hot water for domestic use and supplemental heat for the heat pump systems. Provision was made on each system for the addition of a supplemental solar heating component and its use was demonstrated in Residence 4 (see *Figure 1*).

In-floor radiant heating provides space heating for the facility. This system is suited to the low-grade heat associated with heat pumps, it has low maintenance costs, and contributes to good air quality levels. It has no exposed cabinets, which in typical correctional facilities could be subject to vandalism, dust collection, or are used as areas to conceal contraband.

Thirty packaged heat recovery ventilator (HRV) units provide ventilation for most areas. The supply air is heated through low temperature hot water coils served by the heat pump system. The gymnasium ventilation unit is equipped with a propane-fired duct furnace to handle the large quantities of outside air required for this occupancy. Fan coil units,

supplied by the primary ground loop system, provide cooling to the administrative and program areas.

Other Innovative Approaches

To further study the capabilities of this design, four test loops were installed apart from the boreholes using variations of spiral or "slinky" piping. The standard R-22 refrigerant was substituted in several heat pumps with new refrigerant blends to increase the COP of these units. Because this deviated from traditional building systems, the project was of interest to a graduate student attending university at DalTech in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Troy Green undertook a study of the system as a basis for his graduate thesis.

With the installation of additional monitoring points on the BMS, he is able to monitor the system's operations and compare the various system components. "It has been a really interesting process," said Green. "To be able to study a system that has such innovation incorporated, and

that is actually built and operational is rather unique." Green hopes the findings from his research may provide valuable data for future design use.

IAQ and Thermal Comfort

System design was carried out to comply with ASHRAE Standard 62-1989, Ventilation for Acceptable Indoor Air Quality. Because heat recovery ventilators were used, most areas are provided with 100% outside air rather than recirculated air from the occupied space. Units were sized and located strategically for the varying occupancy of the areas. The units are controlled to operate in conjunction with the lighting systems. This allows for system operation to closely match the occupancy of the space without compromising air quality, which is often experienced in facilities where air-handling units (AHUs) serve large areas and are shut down during low occupancy.

In the gymnasium, CO₂ control of the fresh air quantity is automated through the BMS to minimize energy consumption due to the varying occupancy of the space. The use of fan-coil units in conjunction with the HRVs is effective in maintaining adequate air circulation. This, and accurate temperature control provided by the BMS, were significant steps toward meeting ASHRAE Standard 55-1992, Thermal Environmental Conditions for Human Occupancy. Airflow testing and balancing of all systems was carried out in accordance with AABC methods.

Operation and Maintenance

Building systems were standardized as much as possible to streamline maintenance and minimize replacement parts inventories. When varying capacities were required, multiple units were used. Heat pumps, circulators, water heaters, heat exchangers and filters are examples of this standardization.

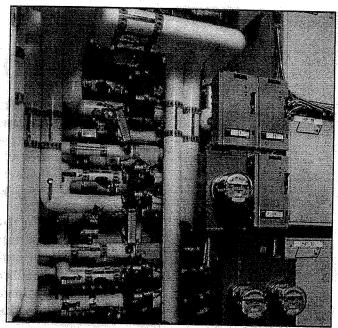
Mark Murdock, chief of engineering and maintenance for the facility, says that once the systems were set up and finetuned, the facility only needs routine maintenance. Murdock said that, "the BMS gives us control and troubleshooting capabilities which save us a lot of time and money." The system provides immediate notification of any alarm conditions, and allows Murdock and his staff to monitor and assess any problems encountered during operations.

Energy Efficiency and Cost Effectiveness

The complex was designed and constructed to R2000 and C2000 standards for residential and commercial construction, and complies with ASHRAE Standard 90.1, Energy Efficient Design of New Buildings Except Low-Rise Residential, and ASHRAE 90.2, Energy Efficient Design of New Low-Rise Residential Buildings.

After total energy consumption for 1996 was calculated, it was found that the facility was operating at 560 MJ/m²/year. This compares favorably with CSC's 700 MJ/m²/year design guideline, and is about one-third of the energy used at traditional CSC facilities.

When the complex was proposed originally, its concept was based entirely on standard construction with no provision for the cost of advanced energy saving systems. Nevertheless,

the project was completed on budget, with no appreciable premium for mechanical system costs.

Conclusion

This project has demonstrated that the strategic combination of energy efficient technologies in the design of a facility can benefit its overall life cycle cost. CSC is using similar strategies in several other facilities. Energy efficient technologies have their place in areas of new design, and strategic implementation of these can benefit future programs tremendously.

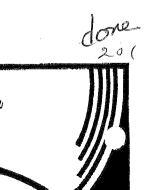

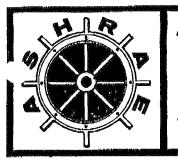

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NB/PEI Chapter Member Wins Award

During the recent ASHRAE Winter Meetings held in Chicago, the Society presented ASHRAE Technology Awards to 10 designers throughout North America. The award-winning projects demonstrate that the application of current HVAC&R technology enables building owners and managers to operate their buildings more cost effectively while providing optimal environmental conditions.

Mr. Tweedie's project at the women's correctional facility in Truro, NS was selected as the best in the institutional building category. The 41,295 sq. ft. facility is served by 30 packaged heat recovery ventilators which contribute to indoor air quality. The design also combines various technologies for optimum energy efficiency and IAQ. Twenty one water-to-water heat pumps were placed in mechanical rooms throughout the building. Propane fired domestic water heaters serve double duty to heat domestic water and back up the heat pump systems. Radiant floor heating provides space heating in the facility.

The total energy consumption is 597,138 equivalent kWh per year, which is about a third of the consumption of other facilities of this nature. This system had an annual operating cost savings of \$5,367 over traditional systems. Payback was immediate as the mechanical systems costs were within the facility's construction budget.

Mr. Tweedie is the director of engineering services at Enerplan Consultants Ltd. in Moncton.
