FAMOUS STORIES FROM **IRISH FOLKLORE**

Myths, fairytales, and legends are a popular part of Irish culture. Here is a brief list of the top five according to Irish Central citing them as the best stories from Irish mythology.

- 1.The Leprechaun.
Dating to the medieval times, the leprechaun is Ireland's most prolific myth. Originally known as tall figures, the now famous leprechaun usually takes the form of a small magical and nefarious figure. Generations have marveled at this long-standing Irish legend
- 2.Fairies
A close second in Irish folklore are fairies. Rooted in Celtic tradition, their alluring charm intrigues humans but often results in misfortune.
- 3.Fionn mac Cumhaill

Finn MacCool is the famous warrior and leader of the Fianna. Today Ireland's military still draws inspiration from the Fianna and this legendary warrior as their cap badges are marked with a FF (Fianna Foil, Soldiers of Destiny). mac Cumhaill gained all the knowledge in the world from eating a magical salmon in the River Boyne.

4.The Shamrock
Although the Harp is the official emblem of Ireland, the Shamrock has become synonymous with Irish culture. The druids believed the shamrock sacred and kept evil away. The Celts believed the number three was sacred. And legend has it Saint Patrick himself used the shamrock to signify the holy trinity. The Shamrock is forever entwined in Irish history.

5.Saint Patrick
The famous Apostle of Ireland is best known for something that is purely myth, banishing the snakes from Ireland. Although Saint Patrick's

memory isn't always properly celebrated, he remains one of the most well-known saints and has become another way for the Irish to identify together culturally.

Pumpkin Spice Old Fashioned

- Prep 15 Min
- Total 1 Hr 15 Min
- Servings 1

May we tempt you with a Pumpkin Spice Old Fashioned? Whether you've been waiting for pumpkin spice season all year or you're just ready to cozy up to some cooler temperatures, this pumpkin spice cocktail is the perfect way to celebrate fall.

Ingredients

Caramelized Simple Syrup

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 cup water

Pumpkin Spice Sugar

2 teaspoons packed brown sugar

1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

Old Fashioned

- Ice
- 1/4 cup bourbon whiskey

- **1** tablespoon (1/2 oz) Caramelized Simple Syrup (see above)
- **3** to 4 drops Angostura™ aromatic bitters
- **1** orange twist

Steps

- **1** To make Caramelized Simple Syrup, in 1-quart saucepan, place 1/4 cup brown sugar and 1 tablespoon of the water over medium heat. Cook, without stirring, 1 to 3 minutes or until sugar caramelizes. Carefully add remaining water; heat to boiling over high heat. Cook 30 to 60 seconds or until sugar dissolves. Transfer to heatproof storage container; cover and refrigerate until cold, at least 1 hour.



- **2** To make Pumpkin Spice Sugar, in small bowl, mix 2 teaspoons brown sugar and the pumpkin pie spice.



- **3** To make Old Fashioned, place the pumpkin spice sugar on a small plate. Wet the rim of a 10-oz old-fashioned glass. Dip the rim of the glass into the spice mixture. Fill glass

with ice. Add bourbon, caramelized simple syrup and bitters; stir. Garnish with orange twist.

Bacon-Wrapped Pork Chops and Cauliflower

- **Prep 20 Min**
- **Total 45 Min**
- **Servings 4**

Herbed bacon-wrapped pork chops and lemony roasted cauliflower come together in a simple sheet-pan dinner the whole family will love.

Ingredients

- **2** packages (10 oz each) fresh cauliflower florets (about 5 cups)
- **3** tablespoons olive oil
- **1/4** teaspoon salt
- **1/4** teaspoon crushed red pepper
- **8** strips bacon
- **4** boneless center-cut pork loin chops, 3/4 inch thick (about 1 lb.)
- **1** tablespoon chopped fresh thyme leaves
- **1/2** teaspoon finely chopped fresh rosemary leaves
- **1/4** teaspoon black pepper
- **1** teaspoon finely grated lemon peel

Steps

- **1** Heat oven to 425°F. Spray bottom of 18x13-inch rimmed sheet pan with cooking spray.
- **2** In large bowl, toss cauliflower, 2 tablespoons

of the olive oil, the salt and red pepper. Spread cauliflower mixture evenly in sheet pan. Roast 20 minutes; stir.

3 Meanwhile, place bacon on microwavable plate. Cover; microwave on High 3 to 4 minutes or just until edges begin to brown but are still soft and pliable.

4 Rub pork chops with remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil; sprinkle with thyme, rosemary and black pepper. Arrange 2 bacon pieces over top of each pork chop, and place in sheet pan with cauliflower, tucking ends of bacon underneath each pork chop

5 Bake 9 to 11 minutes or until meat thermometer inserted in center of pork chop reads at least 145°F. Garnish cauliflower with lemon peel before serving.
