The Dominion Drama Festival came into being in October 1932 and the first Festival Final was staged in Ottawa in the spring of the following year. The Festival movement has reached a stature which prompted the Royal Commission of National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences to remark that "we have been impressed by the warmth and the extent of evidence agreeing that the Dominion Drama Festival is now established as an important national movement and as a unifying force in our cultural life". This year's Regional Festivals started in Toronto, Ontario, on January 7 and conclude in St. John's, Newfoundland on April 6. The Final Festival is scheduled for Edmonton, Alberta from May 20 to May 25, with eight plays chosen from 13 regions to participate.

### REGIONAL ADJUDICATOR

The Dominion Drama Festival is fortunate in having as its Regional Adjudicator this year Cecil Bellamy, the noted British actor, producer and adjudicator.

Mr. Bellamy, who is a member of the British Guild of Drama Adjudicators, first became interested in the theatre when he worked at the Oxford Playhouse with Tyrone Guthrie, John Gielgud, Flora Robson and others. His theatrical background has included the production of Greek and Shakespearian plays, BBC broadcasts, and the adjudication of various festivals including the Combined Forces Drama Festival in Germany.

Mr. Bellamy will decide which groups will be awarded the Regional Calvert Trophies and Calvert Cash Awards, and which regional plays will be invited to the Finals for the main Calvert Trophy and the Calvert \$1,000 Cash Award.
