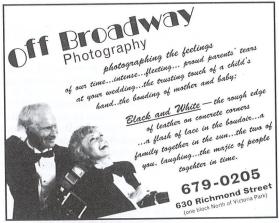
VIRGINIA REH works as a director of theatre, music theatre and opera. Co-Director of the Script Lab, which develops and workshops new Canadian works for theatre and film, she has worked with Equity Showcase, Gryphon Theatre (where she was Artistic Director), the Bayview Playhouse, Tapestry Singers, the Limelight Theatre and the Vancouver, Portland, Edmonton and Canadian Opera companies and Opera Lyra, as well as teaching at the Banff Festival, Sheridan College, the Opera School at the University of Toronto, and Theatre Ontario's summer courses and youth courses. Reh is currently teaching at Brock University.

For the past six years, Reh has worked with the Canadian Children's Opera Chorus as director and acting coach. Her productions of Hansel and Gretel and Wonderful Wolfgang (which she also wrote) have been performed at the Imperial Oil Opera Theatre in Toronto, while her production of The Golden Vanity toured to the U.S. In addition, she is currently dramatic advisor to Opera in Concert. She has also coached performers for various television and film productions. Reh's own acting career

includes stage, television, film, radio and commercial credits.

Reh started her career while a teenager in community theatre in her native New York City, so community theatre remains near and dear to her heart. She has adjudicated theatre festivals for the Kiwanis Music Festival in Orillia, the Oakville One-Act Festival, ACT-CO, EODL, WODL and Theatre Ontario. She received a Master of Dramatic Arts from the University of California at Berkley before moving to Canada in 1971. Reh is now a Canadian citizen and an active promoter of Canadian artists and creations.







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Festival Adjudicator

No stranger to London, PAUL ECK was a member of London Community Players Board of Directors for many years and is now a life-time member of LCP. He was the Administrative Director of Theatre London from 1973 to 1981 and then, until 1983, the General Manager of Orchestra London. Since then, Eck has been the Executive Director of both the Stratford Music Festival and the Quinte Summer Music Festival, General Manager of the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra concurrently with the Toronto Pops Orchestra and, for the past five years, has managed Mississauga's Meadowvale Theatre along with the city's three other theatres.

Eck studied theatre at York University and then received his Diploma in Arts Administration at Harvard. For the past 20 years he has taught in the Technical Theatre Program at Ryerson. He has also taught at the Theatre Ontario summer courses, Confederation College (Thunder Bay), York, U. of T., Brock and Humber College. As a workshop leader, Eck provides seminars in all aspects of arts management, marketing, fund raising, volunteer and board development, playpolishing, text analysis, direction and production.

Much in demand, Eck has adjudicated all regional festivals in Ontario. This is the third time for WODL. He has also adjudicated the Theatre Ontario Festival on three occasions. Other adjudications include the State of Michigan festival, Sears Drama Festival and the Ontario Multicultural Theatre Festival.

In 1978, Eck was awarded the Queen's Silver Jubilee Medal for his service to the arts in Canada and has twice been awarded Volunteer Service Awards by Ontario. He is an Honourary Life member of Theatre Ontario. In 1989, he was named to the Senate of the Canadian Association of Cultural Executives.

At present, Paul Eck is President of the Campus and Community Impresarios of Ontario and the Steering Committee of the unique Living Arts Centre in Mississauga. He is an active member of the Canadian Theatre Research Association, the Canadian Conference of the Arts and the Theatre Ontario Talent Bank. As an associate of Lord Cultural Management, Eck recently completed an Economic Impact study of the Arts for the Province of Nova Scotia, a cultural policy for the city of Thunder Bay and the Ontario Culture and Tourism Study.

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Greetings from Bernard Hopkins

(complete transcript of Mr. Hopkins' letter)



It is a privilege to welcome you all to the W.O.D.L. Festival '94. The Community Theatre is one of the last strongholds of a true Neighbourhood activity done by the Neighbourhood for the Neighbourhood and this festival, in which many Neighbourhoods meet in one location to share their art and commitment to theatre, is exciting and unique. Welcome everyone.

My own interest and beginnings in the theatre started and were fostered by Community Theatre. In my early teens, I was a member of **Unity Players** in Liverpool, U.K., and I remember the first line they let me speak - "I wish your enterprise today may thrive" - *Publius* in **Julius Caesar**. Soon after, two of the lads announced they were about to do auditions for the **Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts** (**R.A.D.A.**) and in my vanity I thought, "I'm as good as they are." So I applied for an audition too.

I remember the audition well. Fifty or sixty of us sat or stood on stone steps leading down to the underground 'Little Theatre' at the R.A.D.A. The nerves and fears were palpable and I was handing out bits of candy assuring people they needed them to create spit. Somewhere I'd learned actors need lots of saliva. I did a piece from Moliere's Sagnarelle and a bit from John Arden's Sergeant Musgrave Dance. (Years later, I was to be told by the famed actress Flora Robson, one of the adjudicators, that the way I treated Moliere was, to say the least, impertinent.) When the results of that audition arrived in the mail - a white envelope with R.A.D.A. printed in bright red in the left hand corner, I was so sure of rejection, I left the envelope in my coat pocket for three days before I dared open it. Well -I was accepted.

My directing career started in Community Theatre too. I was playing at the Nottingham Playhouse, U.K., in 1968. When the community theatre there lost a director for A Midsummer Night's Dream that was to start rehearsing the next week, they called the Playhouse for help and, as I had at that point in my life been in five different productions of the play, the Playhouse suggested that I might be of help. Of course, I went there and put on the stage all my favourite bits of the five productions I'd been in. I later directed The Royal Hunt of the Sun and The Government Inspector for that group of wonderful people, some of whom I'm still in touch with.

I have also done the one night stand routine that these companies will be doing here at the **Palace** this week: the eight a.m. bus call, heading toward an unknown theatre with scenery, props, costumes, stage managers and actors, all squashed together. The arrival is always exciting, but then it begins to dawn that the work ahead to get the curtain up by eight p.m. is going to be very hard. Everyone digs in, myriad things go wrong, but somehow by eight o'clock you do get the curtain up. It is often miraculous, though when I did it all those years ago, there was an added embarrassment.

After the performance we all had to stand on the stage while the stage manager read from a clipboard - "Actors X and Y, you will be spending the night with Mr. and Mrs. A. B." There were no hotels in these tiny towns and we were forced to rely on "the kindness of strangers". These well meaning, often delightful, people would open their homes to the actors (rogues and vagabonds) and invariably offer them tea and a piece of cake. With no disrespect to these people, the actors, reviewing the day from that eight a.m. bus call, really needed a plate of stew and a few beers. They quickly learned to travel with meat pies, cheese, nuts, dates, a loaf of bread and, of course, the beers, which were consumed with relish after the hosts had gone to bed. But for all that it was exciting and I cannot remember a moment of it being either dull or boring.

I was with the Glasgow Citizens' Theatre in the late sixties playing at the Belgrade Festival of Avant Garde Theatre in the former Yugoslavia (rather odd that, in a festival of Avant Garde Theatre, eighteen of the twenty-five entries were plays by Shakespeare). We were doing three short plays under the one title Triple Image and on our way there a skip was lost. It contained nine wigs, nine pairs of shoes and sundry props. The theatre was tremendously helpful and managed, in no time at all, to find us nine wigs, ready and dressed, replacements for the sundry props - however, they couldn't, under any circumstances, find or replace our shoes. So, beautifully coiffed and rather well propped, we did our three short plays barefoot.

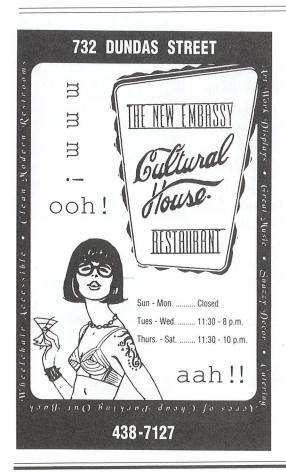

Never mind. It's as old and new and persistent as the seasons and a tribal ceremony of religious worth - which is where it all started. The Palace Theatre is at 710 Dundas Street. I was born at 580. I saw my first plays at the Grand. So, in a sense I come full circle with my cheers, congratulations and good wishes. I would be with you if it were not for acting in a New York City student film production of a lovely little student-written play (note I say ''play'') all of twelve minutes long. Why do it? I suppose I might say it's my own student's rediscovery of my great great grandma's bequest. However, I shall be with you in spirit.

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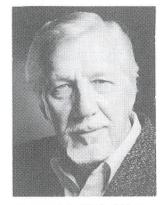
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Greetings from William Hutt
