


ST. THOMAS' ANGLICAN CHURCH TORBOLTON, ONTARIO



IN THE BEGINNING . . .

On January 12, 1872, St. Thomas was given "one quarter acre more or less" of land on the farm of James and Susan Abbott. The present site was transferred to St. Thomas, Jan. 18, 1876 by John Hedley and his wife. A document was forwarded to the Rt. Rev. John Travers Lewis, requesting him to consecrate St. Thomas Church and cemetery both being free of debt. Names attached to this document were: John W. Weatherdon, W. J. Humphries, Thos. I. Vance, Thos. Vance Sr., Wm. Wilson, John Hedley, Thos. Wetherley.

On the 20th day of December, 1882 Bishop Lewis consecrated the first "St. Thomas", the small frame church many still remember with deep affection.

Congratulations on the Fiftieth Anniversary of your fine church.



NOTES FROM VESTRY MEETING MINUTES

APRIL 21, 1908

Matters relative to a new church were then brought up but it was decided to leave it over and call a Congregational meeting.

APRIL 13, 1909

After some discussion re-stipend it was decided to borrow amount owing Rector out of building fund account.

MARCH 29, 1910

James Brown reported \$289.96 in the Bank to the credit of the building fund. \$13.00 owing on amount borrowed last year from this fund was made up and paid over to Mr. Brown making a total of \$302.96 to the credit of the building fund.

APRIL 17, 1911

The building fund as per bank book was \$743.25.

APRIL 9, 1912

Bank book of building fund showed \$1,234.05 to the credit of the church.

APRIL 4, 1913

Building fund \$1,875.07 two cheques were given for stone being

\$32.25 and \$21.25 leaving a balance in the bank of \$1,821.47.

The following were elected to form the Building Committee, the wardens, Peter Wilson and Frank Weatherdon, H. Poole, Jas. B. Wilson, J. A. Baird and Jas. Brown.

APRIL 9, 1915

James Brown, treasurer of building fund reported balance in the bank of \$2,048.63.

Tenders for building the new church were placed before the

It was moved by F. G. Weatherdon and seconded by James B. Wilson that the tender of C. J. Speagle of \$4,850.00 be accepted.

The election resulted as follows: the wardens J. A. Baird and Jas. B. Wilson and a committee of six being Peter Wilson, F. G. Weatherdon, H. Poole, James Brown, Justin Davis and W. J. Major.

APRIL 25, 1916

The report of the Building fund accounts was presented by the treasurer Jas. Brown. It was moved that the Building fund report as printed be adopted. This vestry meeting was rather lengthy as it included many votes of thanks for gifts received and letters of appreciation were sent to each person:

Miss Lizzie Dolan and the others of the family for the beautiful

chancel window.

Mrs. John Hedley and Mrs. James Brown for the beautiful East window.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Blewett for the brass Lectern and Bible.

The Reverend John Osborne for the brass Altar-desk. The Reverend E. A. Johnston for a cheque for \$10.00 with which

a brass alms basin was purchased.

Rev. Franklin Clarke expressed the feeling of pleasure and thankfulness that the great work of building a new church which had been started a year ago had been accomplished and they were meeting in the basement of the new building for the first time. He expressed his appreciation of the zeal and enthusiasm of the people in the great work. He also thanked the wardens and other members of the Building Committee for the ready way in which

they seconded all his efforts and the splendid support which they

gave their Rector in bringing the work to a successful issue.

As a slight token of appreciation and in preparation for many cold cutter drives from Fitzroy Harbour to Woodlawn, a Raccoon coat and gauntlets to match were purchased and presented to Rev. Franklin Clarke.

APRIL 10, 1917

Rev. Franklin Clarke reported special collections amounting to \$171.73 which were probably the largest collections for missions in the history of the congregation. This was a good sign, considering the heavy extra expense the congregation had, in erecting

their new church.

Miss Mable Vance brought the money from the sale of a quilt being \$21.00 towards the building fund. But as all debts in connection with the New church had been paid it was set aside towards the purchase of an Altar Rail and Miss Vance was asked to act as treasurer of this fund.

The Rector reported the number of families as 52, an increase

of 6 over the previous year

The Building Fund Report was presented for the treasurer,

James Brown by the Chairman.

Receipts \$114.29; Expenses \$96.08; Balance \$18.21, paid to Warden

J. A. Baird.

At this meeting it was decided that the parish year be made to close on December 31st, to correspond with the Synod year.





NOTES FROM VESTRY RECORDS

APRIL 4, 1915

Easter Sunday: Special collection for building fund—\$55.01.

MAY 10, 1915

Tuesday-Rogation Day-7.30 p.m.

Last service in the old church before it was moved back to allow for building of the new church. 25 present. Service conducted by Rev. Franklin Clarke.

The corner stone of the New St. Thomas' Church was laid by the Right Rev. Dr. Roper, Bishop of Ottawa.

The following clergy being present:

Rev. Archdeacon MacKay, Rural Dean Whalley; The Reverends Pick, Osborne, Iveson, Wemberly, Turley, MacMorine and the Rector.

Present a large crowd, \$195.00 offering was received for the building fund.

The Laying of the corner stone on Dominion Day, July 1st, 1915 at 11.00 a.m. was Bishop Ropers' first visit to the Parish of Fitzroy Harbour. The silver trowel used was presented to Bishop Roper as a momento.

JULY 11, 1915

Trinity VI — Evensong and confirmation at St. Thomas' Church with 21 candidates by Bishop Roper at 7.30 p.m.

JULY 18, 1915

Trinity VII — First Communion for the Confirmation candidates was held at $10.30~\mathrm{a.m.}$

OCTOBER 3, 1915

Harvest Thanksgiving offering for the building fund, \$12.67. Service of Evensong at $7.30~\rm p.m.$

DECEMBER 12, 1915

Advent III — Last Sunday Service held in Old Church. Holy Communion at 10.30 a.m.

DECEMBER 14, 1915

Sercularization of the Old Church, 11.00 a.m. Consecration of the New Church, 7.00 p.m. Confirmation candidates the night, the Church was opened 14th of December, were:

Mrs. T. L. Wilson, Mrs. Henry Porteous Sr., Mr. and Mrs. Wm. John Carr, Mr. Harvey Carr, Mr. Thomas Dolan, Mr. Samuel Dolan.

The services for the day were performed by the Right Rev. John Charles Roper, D.D., Bishop of Ottawa assisted by Rev. T. H. Iveson, Rev. R. S. Jones and the Rector; Rev. T. H.Iveson, preacher. The offering being \$73.86 at the 11.00 a.m. service and \$41.56 at the 7.00 p.m. service was towards the new lighting system. The day was stormy, snowing and blowing. Dinner and tea were served in the basement.

THE INTERVENING YEARS . . .

The minutes in the Vestry book, were written by the Rev. Franklin Clarke from 1914 to 1921, as each year he was appointed Vestry Clerk. In 1922, Vestry was held in the Union Bank building. In 1923, a motion is on record to held a box social, proceeds to be used for a Rectory Fund. The Rev. E. W. Richards served from 1922 to 1926, when the Rev. C. C. Phillips became Rector.

An attempt was made at the 1926 meeting, to have people pay monthly by envelope for Stipend, and quarterly for Mission, as arrears in the stipend money seems to have been a nagging problem at many Vestry meetings. In the grim days of the depression, two Special Meetings are on record, in 1931, almost bonding the Wardens to guarantee the Rector his salary. However, in the years that followed, money continued to be borrowed from other funds, e.g. mission, and paid back later, in order to meet the Stipend. In 1942 under the Rectorship of the Rev. R. S. V. Crossley, a motion was moved to put all monies in one fund, in order that there be sufficient funds available to meet the stipend on a regular basis. At this time, action was begun to bring the Cemetery up to its present well kept standard.

In 1934, a special meeting decided to install electric lights in the church, power being supplied from a Delco plant at the store. The Rev. Grant Jones was Rector. Chicken suppers, which had been the custom, were discontinued at this time, and a furnace was installed in the centre of the basement, which led to the disuse of the basement as a Parish Hall, for some years.

While the Rev. Robert Strachan was Rector, the church was re-roofed and the interior redecorated. Plans for the building of a new Rectory were begun, which building was completed and put in use while the Rev. W. J. Belford was Rector.

In 1958, under the Chairmanship of the Rev. R. V. A. Rogers, the Vestry Meeting discussed renovating the basement and installing a new oil furnace. Since then a fine Church Hall has emerged, with kitchen facilities, and good accommodation for Sunday School and various Parish groups. A good drilled well and washroom facilities, have recently been added. During this time, our responsibilities out of the Parish were not forgotten, for St. Thomas Church completed their apportionment of \$5,700.00 to the Diocesan Jubilee Extension Fund.

Our present Rector, is the Rev. Ralph W. Smith.

In 1932, William Wallace Davis, a son of the Parish, was ordained to the priesthood and has since become Bishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia. He is the son of the late Isaac Davis, and Mrs. Davis.

Bishop Davis likes to recall things which made a lasting impression on his mind when a boy, and he remembers in particular, one of his Sunday School teachers, the late Mrs. H. Poole, whose faith seemed to him to be "catching". The Church continues to train her young in the Faith, and She is ever in need of people who will give their lives full time to the Ministry, as well as loving and faithful workers among the laity.

God is everywhere. St. Thomas' Church, like other places of worship brings His Presence into focus for succeeding generations of worshippers. This gives us cause for Thanksgiving, on this our Fiftieth Anniversary.
