

WESTERN ONTARIO DRAMA FESTIVAL

The Western Ontario Drama Festival is a preliminary competition of the Dominion Drama Festival which will be held this year in the Walker Theatre, Winnipeg, during the week of May the sixteenth with Mr. Barrett H. Clark of New York, as adjudicator. This is the first year in which the final adjudicator will be an American. It is the first year in which the final festival has not been held at Ottawa. It is also the first year in which both full length and short plays will be presented at the final festival. All invitations to take part in it will be in the absolute discretion of the Dominion Drama Festival Executive. It is expected that the final festival will consist of four full length plays (three English and one French) and twelve short plays (nine English and three French), and invitations will be issued upon the report of the regional adjudicator, Mr. Malcolm Morley. This year Mr. Morley will not only rank the plays but will also indicate what plays, in his opinion, should be invited to take part in the final festival, and any plays which fail to receive such recommendation, although ranking first in their particular region, will not be invited to Winnipeg.

The full length plays being presented in the Western Ontario Drama League Festival this year have been chosen from eleven plays presented by the competing groups in preliminary performances in their own theatres throughout Western Ontario with Miss Nella Jefferis and Mr. E. G. Sterndale Bennett as adjudicators. In addition to the plays invited to compete the following presentations were given:

THE PLAYERS GUILD OF HAMILTON — "Promise," by Henry Bernstein,

THE BRANTFORD DRAMA LEAGUE — "The Mask and The Face," by C. B. Fernald.

KITCHENER-WATERLOO LITTLE THEATRE — "Elizabeth The Queen," by Maxwell Anderson, and "Accent on Youth," by Samson Raphaelson.

NIAGARA FALLS LITTLE THEATRE GUILD — "First Lady," by Katharine Dayton and George S. Kaufman.

The players Guild of Hamilton, the Galt Little Theatre and the Sarnia Drama League gave presentations of "Bright and Glorious." by Mrs. R. K. Stratford in the preliminaries and upon the report of the adjudicators the Sarnia Drama League was awarded the Jamieson Shield and invited to present "Bright and Glorious" in the Western Ontario Drama League Festival at Windsor.

MALCOLM MORLEY

To a large number of Festival audiences across Canada Mr. Malcolm Morley needs no introduction, as he was Regional Adjudicator for the Festival in 1935 and on that occasion made hosts of friends and admirers, from Halifax to Vancouver.

Few persons connected with theatrical life of the present day have had as wide or varied experiences as has Malcolm Morley. Born in Aldershot, England, he came to America early in life and received his later education at Harvard University. Commencing his career as a journalist he soon became interested in acting and first appeared at the Garden Theatre, New York, with J. E. Kellerd in "Hamlet". He acted under the direction of George Arliss, Nat Goodwin, Grace George and William Faversham. He later became managing director of the Cincinnati Arts Theatre. Returning to England he played first at the Ambassadors Theatre, London, in 1921, and later at the Kingsway, Birmingham. Returning to London he then became Manager for the well-known English producer, Leon Lyon. Between the years 1926 and 1931 he produced plays at Everyman Theatre, London.

Mr. Morley is also the author of works on the English stage and English players. His name ranks among the foremost in England as a critic of the stage and as producer of the modern drama. As actor, producer, writer and critic, Mr. Morley therefore brings to his present task a wealth of knowledge and experience seldom equalled in dramatic circles of the present day.

Mr. Morley as Regional Adjudicator this year is receiving a tremendous ovation from coast to coast. We have much pleasure in welcoming him again to Western Ontario.

THE WESTERN ONTARIO DRAMA LEAGUE

THE DRAMA IN WESTERN ONTARIO

The Western Ontario Drama League is composed of those little theatre groups in Western Ontario which compete from time to time in the annual festival. Only groups which have been in existence long enough to have a regular programme and a sustaining membership or audience are invited to compete. Preference is always given to civic groups and church groups or school groups are as a rule not invited. During the past six years since the formation of the Western Ontario Drama League there have been great strides forward both in the memberships of the groups and the quality of the presentations given.

The groups competing in the festival this year were eight in number.

THE LONDON LITTLE THEATRE

The history of amateur drama in London goes back over 33 years during which time there has been at least one presentation given every year. The original groups were the Huron College Players, the Western University Players Club and the London Dramatic Club. This last group competed in the Earl Grey Musical and Dramatic Competition from 1907 to 1911 and twice the Margaret Anglin Bracelet to London. The present London Little Theatre is an amalgamation of the London Drama League, the Meredith Players, the Half-Way House Theatre and the London Community Drama Guild. It has a closed membership of 1,550 who subscribe in advance for the five presentations given each year, the 1937-38 bill being "The Mask and The Face," "Escape", "The Late Christopher Bean", "Michael and Mary" and "First Lady". All presentations are given in the Grand Theatre. The London Little Theatre has an extension department which assists smaller dramatic groups in London and this year it is running a drama festival open to all groups in London other. and this year it is running a drama festival open to all groups in London other than the London Little Theatre.

Since 1933 London groups have three times won the Hanna Shield awarded to the group ranking first in the W.O.D.L. Festival and were invited to the final Festival in 1933, 1934, 1935 and 1936. In the 1935 final Festival Mr. Vincent G. Perry of London, won the memento given by Her Excellency, Lady Bessborough, for the second best male performance in the festival. At the final festival in 1936 the London Little Theatre was awarded the Bessborough Trophy and the Sir Barry Jackson Challenge Trophy for its presentation of "Twenty-Five Cents", an original Canadian play, written by W. Eric Harris and produced by Mrs. G. A. P. Brickenden of London.

THE PLAYERS GUILD OF HAMILTON

Hamilton has an even longer record of amateur dramatic performances than London. The Garrick Club, which is now incorporated with the Players Guild of Hamilton, was founded in 1857 by John Crerar and also successfully competed in the Earl Grey Musical and Dramatic Competition from 1907 to 1911. One of the members of the Garrick Club, Miss Caroline H. Crerar, is now chairman of the Players Guild. The Guild has an open membership of 400 with an active membership of 138. Its programme for 1937-38 includes three one-act plays: "Exhibit C", "Contents Noted", (original plays by members of the Guild) and a scene from "Twelfth Night", "Promise", "Night of January Sixteenth" and "Children to Bless You".

The Players Guild had the honour of winning the Hanna Shield at the first Western Ontario Drama League Festival in 1933, and in 1933 and 1936 were invited to compete at the final festival. The Guild has a very active playwriting group and has produced many of the plays written by its members.

THE SARNIA DRAMA LEAGUE

The Drama Club of Sarnia, a reading and study group, was formed in 1927 and the Sarnia Drama League, the producing group, in 1928. The League this year celebrated its 10th anniversary and gave its 32nd regular presentation. During the last few years it has been a part of the Sarnia Music and Drama Association with a closed membership of 650. There are 125 active playing members and the 1937-1938 bill included "Bird in Hand", "Bright and Glorious", "Bill of Divorcement" and "Yellow Jack". Part of the regular work of the league is to assist in every way possible the various church dramatic groups in Sarnia.

The Drama Club was invited to the final festival in 1933 and the Drama League in 1934 and 1935. In 1934 Mr. J. E. Adams of Sarnia was awarded the memento given by Her Excellency, Lady Bessborough, for the best individual performance by a man in the final festival for his presentation of the Dean of Stour in "The Mob". Sarnia has a very active playwriting group and in 1936 Mr. W. Eric Harris, the author of "Twenty-Five Cents", won the cash prize of \$100.00 given by the Dominion Drama Festival Committee for the best Canadian play presented at a regional festival. This year Mrs. R. K. Stratford won the Western Ontario Drama League playwriting contest in which there were 41 entries and the Jamieson Shield was awarded to the Sarnia Drama League for its presentation of her play "Bright and Glorious".

THE BRANTFORD DRAMA LEAGUE

The Brantford Drama League is the only group in Western Ontario with its own playhouse and has been giving regular performances for many years. It has a subscription membership which fills the Playhouse, seating 185, for two performances. Any subscriber may also be a member of the Players' Guild, the league's school of the theatre, which presents plays in rehearsal form and gives an opportunity for study and trying out new talent. During the 1937-1938 season the following presentations will be given: "The Mask and The Face", "Bright and Glorious", Scenes from Shakespeare, "The House of Juke", "At Close Range", "The Message", "White Dresses", "It Only Happens in Books", "E and O.E.", and "George and Margaret".

In 1937 the Brantford Drama League won the Hanna Shield and in 1936 and 1937 were invited to the final festival at Ottawa. At the 1937 festival Mr. G. A. P. Arnold of Brantford was given special mention for his performance of Don Gonzalo in "A Sunny Morning". As part of its regular programme Brantford arranges exchanges of presentations with Galt and Hamilton.

THE GALT LITTLE THEATRE

One of the charter members of the Western Ontario Drama League was the Galt Collegiate Institute Staff Players Club and after several years of excellent work they were in large part responsible for the formation of the present Galt Little Theatre, a civic group. Presentations are given in their theatre in Tassie Hall. There is an active study or studio group of 142 and the open membership fills Tassie Hall, seating about 700 people for two performances. The 1937-1938 bill includes "Yellow Sands", "The Queen's Husband", "Bright and Glorious", and a long play yet to be selected. The Galt Little Theatre always fostered the presentation of Canadian plays and has several playwriters amongst its members.

The Galt Players have twice won the Jamieson Shield in 1934 and 1937 and were awarded the Meredith Achievement Trophy in 1936. In 1937 Mr. H. J. Bassett of Galt was the author of the prize winning Canadian play in the W.O.D.L. preliminary performances. No one present will forget the enjoyable presentation of "Brothers in Arms" by the Galt Staff Players Club at the final

festival, Ottawa, in 1934.

THE BORDER THEATRE GUILD, WINDSOR

The little theatre movement which had lain dormant in Windsor for several years was revived in March, 1934, with the formation of The Border Theatre Guild and its progress since that time has been outstanding. In 1935 the first year the Guild competed in the festival at London it was ranked a very close second receiving the Fuller Shield and was invited to present its entry, the first act of "The Torchbearers", in the final festival at Ottawa, where it received high praise.

The Guild has an open membership of 500 and a large studio or study group. In addition to the public performances regular studio evenings are held at which plays are read and produced. Several of its members have written plays which have been produced by the Guild. The 1937-1938 season includes the following plays: "Accent on Youth", "The Show-Off" and "The Petrified Forest". The Windsor group are noted in Western Ontario for their choice of plays and the finish of their performances.

THE KITCHENER-WATERLOO LITTLE THEATRE

Although only formed late in 1935 Kitchener-Waterloo has an exceedingly active little theatre group. It has a closed subscription membership of 750 and a studio group with a membership of 350. During the past year the experimental group has conducted a course in acting and stage craft with an attendance of 40. In addition divisional interest groups have been meeting with the following attendance: staging 10, playwriting 15, make-up 16, costuming 15, acting 75, directing 12, playreading 15. Its 1937-1938 bill includes "Elizabeth The Queen", "Accent on Youth" and "Orders Are Orders".

The Kitchener-Waterloo Little Theatre has conducted playwriting competitions during the last two years and this year performances are being given of the following plays written by its members: "Time For Tony", "The Towneley Shepherd Play", "The White Waistcoat", "Tuesday Is Mrs. Tyler's", and "Red Seal".

The Kitchener-Waterloo Little Theatre first competed in the festival in 1937. This year it was awarded the Meredith Achievement Trophy for its presentation of "Elizabeth The Queen" in the preliminaries because in the opinion of the adjudicator their group shows greatest promise of future achievement.

THE NIAGARA FALLS LITTLE THEATRE GUILD

The Niagara Falls Little Theatre Guild entered the festival for the first time this year. It has an active membership of 22, an associate membership of 91, and a large attendance at its public presentations. Its 1937-1938 bill includes "First Lady", "Brothers in Arms", "The Monkey's Paw" and a long play to be given in April. The Niagara Falls group shows much promise and with continued work will no doubt make its mark in future festivals.

The following additional groups have competed in the festival from time to time: The Laskay Dramatic Club, King; The Ridgetown Players; The Columbus Players, Guelph; The Woodstock Little Theatre Guild; The Little Theatre Guild of St. Thomas; The St. Andrews Dramatic Society, Fergus; The Hamilton Gaelic Society Players; The London Life Players Club, London; The Merton Players, Bronte; The University of Western Ontario Players Club, London; St. Thomas Players Guild; Thespis Players, London; The Loretto Players, Hamilton.

There are in addition many smaller groups affiliated or working with the above groups, two new civic groups in Guelph and Owen Sound giving yearly presentations and hundreds of school and church dramatic groups in all parts of Western Ontario.
