

"In the midst of life we are in death" Book of Common Prayer p. 601

The above phrase is taken from the liturgy for the burial of the dead and I find it particularly fitting for the season of Lent. In a season when we contemplate the sacrificial love of Jesus, his death on the cross, and ultimately his resurrection, we are reminded over and over again that life and death go hand in hand. Call it biology; in order for something to be alive it must also have the capacity to die. Call it physics; according to the first law of thermodynamics, energy can neither be created nor destroyed. Call it chemistry; molecules are constantly being rearranged and changing forms. Much like scientists, being a person of faith requires asking questions. I am not one that ascribes to the idea of "blind faith." My faith is informed, researched and thoughtful. I continue to question aspects of the Christian faith and over time I have found my faith to be more resilient and honest.

What does it mean to live life knowing that we are in the midst of death? I think it means seeking out new creation and signs of new life on a regular basis. This doesn't mean just looking for new growth in the garden or waiting for buds to develop on trees. It means finding those things that add value, love, joy and hope to our lives and the lives of others. This again takes us back to the law of thermodynamics—we cannot continue to add value, love, joy etc, without subtracting something else from the equation. For example, if you want to love more you must let go of hate. If you want more joy you must let go of sorrows. As individuals we only have so much time and energy to spend, and for the most part, how we spend it is entirely up to us. Someone once told me that happiness is a mindset and I tend to strongly agree with that. Sometimes it is easier to maintain that mindset than others, but, for the most part it is something I strive towards.

If death is ever present around us, as part of the natural cycle of life and as a sacrificial choice we make in our day to day lives, then there is indeed the potential for it to overwhelm us. None of us are immune to grief or sorrow and they are emotions that are just as strong as love and happiness, sometimes seemingly even more so. However, we get to choose what we focus on, what we strive towards, and what we allow to guide us.

In an effort to aid you in your own journey our parish will be offering some wonderful opportunities for learning, prayer and worship. During the first two Sundays of Lent we will be talking about two different ways to pray. One style is more tactile, as we learn about the Anglican rosary. The other is more contemplative, as we approach worship in a more quiet and reflective way. I hope that you will find value and benefit in both. Our Lenten Studies program this year will once again take the form of a book club type study. *Saying Yes To Life: The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2020* by Ruth Valerio draws on the days of creation and helps to shift our focus from everyday concerns to issues that are impacting millions of people worldwide. Each session will include prayer, discussion and an aid to action, encouraging each of us to bring life and hope into places of death and despair. This book is available on Amazon, Indigo and I'm sure other places as well.

This year as we make the painful journey towards the cross, wrestling with feelings of sin, sadness and grief, I pray that we will be able to look beyond the cross to the resurrection, the joy of new life and the ecstasy of redemption. May your journey be blessed and may you find the strength to choose life even while in the midst of death.



Saying Yes to Life lifts our focus from every day (and perfectly natural) concerns to issues that are impacting millions of lives around the world. As people made in

the image of God, we are entrusted to look after what God has made – to share in the joy and creativity of God in making a difference for good. Ruth Valerio imaginatively draws on the Days of Creation (Genesis 1-2:2) in relating themes of light, water, land, the seasons, other creatures, humankind, Sabbath rest and resurrection hope to matters of environmental, ethical and social concern. Foundational to the book are what it means to be human and, in particular, to be a follower of Jesus during Lent. Voices from other continents are heard throughout, and each chapter ends with discussion questions, a prayer, and specially commissioned art to aid action and contemplation.

EASTER CHOCOLATE: Help us start a Cacao Farm!

Many of you are familiar with our parish's relationship with Father Vanderhoff and the community of Buenavista in Mexico, where he serves. The coffee farmers in the Oaxaca region, who we used to support through our Fair Trade coffee program, are slowly recovering from the recent earthquakes and drought. This year some of their new coffee plants will bear fruit for the first time! Now, partly because of changes in climate in the area, the local co-operative has begun an initiative to diversify and to start growing cacao (which produces cocoa), which is better suited to conditions in the lower-altitude areas. The Mexican Fair Trade co-op has quotes for seeds, grafting materials, special bags for growing the seedlings, and rolls of plastic for roof shields, totalling approximately \$1,600 Cdn. Fifteen local farmers will give their time and labour to prepare a one hectare field.

In an effort to help our friends in Buenavista reach their goal, our parish decided to replace the Easter flower program with an *Easter Memorial and Celebration Plan*. As with the very successful Christmas program, for a tax-deductible donation of \$10 or more, your dedications will be printed in the Easter bulletin (deadline is April 5).

MOTHERING SUNDAY dates back to the 16th century and is celebrated on the Fourth Sunday in Lent in Anglican churches in the United Kingdom and Ireland, and many other Anglophone countries, especially in Canada and Australia. On this day services were held in the parish church, or at the nearest cathedral which is the diocesan Mother Church. Children and young people working as apprentices or "in service" (think downstairs at Downton Abbey) were given the day off so they could visit their families or return to their Mother church, the church in which they were

baptised. The children were allowed to bake a cake to take home. They would often pick wild flowers to either place in the church or give to their mother. Usually they attended church with their mother or whole family. This was the only day off that they were allowed as other days would conflict with working hours. Mothering Sunday is not to be confused with Mother's Day which is a secular holiday celebrated in North America and other countries in May. It is quite distinct from the original Mothering Sunday. The Anglican churches in Canada, especially those

with a Mother's Union branch, recognise Mothering Sunday in various ways such as with a simnel cake or decorated cookies to be enjoyed by all who attend church on that day. A simnel cake is a light fruit cake with 2 layers of marzipan (almond paste), one in the centre and the other on the top. 11 or 12 marzipan balls, depending on whether or not Judas is included, represent the Apostles, and are paced in a ring around the edge of the cake.

In our Parish of French Village a mother (or someone who has shown mothering traits) is selected from amongst our parishioners; an acknowledgement of that person is read in church and a bouquet is presented.
