Sue Perron is a long-time Guild member. She was born and raised in the Parkland area of Saskatchewan. She moved to Prince George, BC in 2002. She, like her mother, was always interested in plants and their uses, and the respect that is afforded nature when gathering plants for her own use. A science background helped to explain the varieties of plants and their similarities and differences. An association with other Indigenous Elders in the Prince George area expanded these learnings. Sue volunteers with various agencies, often taking students or other interested parties on nature walks in the surrounding area. She collects plants, in season, to use for demonstrations during the year. A curious mind is a great gift.



Fibres on the Wild Side ~ March 17th 7:00pm in the Guild Room . 💏

When walking in a natural area, we breathe in the freshness of the land. Fibres surround us. We may not yet be familiar with the sources, but Indigenous Peoples have used them for many years. Many lessons were learned from the Elders in their communities, including: understanding protocols for collecting, understanding the collection times, recognizing the plants, collecting the plant materials, extracting the rough fibre, preparing the fibre for use, and using the fibres for many traditional uses. Fibre sources and uses were varied from location to location. Interesting as well, the fibre sources were often used for other purposes such as food, medicine, dyes, adornment, and technical purposes. This presentation will mention some of the history, uses and interesting stories about various local fibre plants. There will be a selection of local plant samples available to examine and handle.

Ceinture Fleche: a Brief Walk Through History ~ April 28th 7:00pm in the Guild Room .

Sashes, belts and tumplines have been in use for many years by Indigenous Peoples and Europeans. The story of the Ceinture Fleché, also known as the Assumption Sash, speaks of tradition, colonialization, of cottage industry, of the fur trade, the buffalo hunts, of political unrest, of rebellion and diaspora. It also speaks of weaving expertise, of hard work, dedication, commerce, resilience, re-emergence and pride. This presentation will mention the story of the Ceinture Fleché, Coventry sash, and the ceremonial sashes seen today. Some of the weaving processes related to the sash will be discussed. There will be materials displayed and opportunity to try some basic finger weaving techniques.

BURN TEST

Wondering what the fibre is in your yarn? Do the burn test. Take a piece of the yarn and burn it. If it is animal hair, it will smell like burning hair, produce gray-blue smoke, have black ash that crumbles to a powder, and go out quickly when the flame is removed. If it smells like burning grass and ignites and burns completely, it is cellulose. If it creates hard black beaded balls, it is acrylic. Although this test identifies or rules out other fibers, it is not conclusive.
