**Caring For
Your New
Flag**

How long can I expect my flag to last?

The MassCor flag you have purchased is made with time-tested materials and quality craftsmanship, but sooner or later, all flags will deteriorate through normal wear and tear and exposure to the elements. Tests have shown that flags flown only during daylight hours will last four times longer than those flown continuously. The federal government expects nylon or cotton bunting flags to provide 90 days of service when flown from sunrise to sunset, if taken down during inclement weather. Reasonable care and timely attention can significantly add to the life of your flag. When it comes time to retire your flag, please follow Flag Code guidelines.



How can I clean my flag?

To retain your flag's vibrant colors and maintain its brightness, **clean it regularly** before dirt, smoke, dust, or other airborne contaminants permanently set in the fabric, soiling and discoloring it.

Outdoor Flags

Flags suitable for exterior use may be handwashed in warm water using a mild soap followed by a thorough rinse, and then spread out to dry. Do not allow the flag to sit in the wash water, as some color bleed into the white fabric may occur.

Indoor Flags

Professional dry cleaning is recommended for all indoor flags.

Essential Maintenance Tips

Inspect your flag on a regular basis

Evaluate your flag for signs of wear such as fraying or thread breakage which may occur on the whipped end away from the flagpole or staff. You can trim and re-hem frayed edges to help extend the life of your flag.

Flag fibers can benefit from periodic rest

It is helpful to rotate two flags regularly, using the downtime to care for the idle flag. By having a spare, you will be able to continue to fly a flag while the other is being cleaned, rested, and repaired.

Mind the condition of your flag pole

Ensure your flag pole is free of dirt, rust, and corrosion.

Only flags that are made for outdoor use should be displayed in exterior settings.

If possible, do not subject your flag to rain, snow, or abnormally high winds as this exposure can shorten the life of your flag. If your flag becomes wet, spread it out and let it dry completely before storing. **Do not fold or roll up a damp or wet flag.**

Try not to fly your flag where the wind can whip it across rough surfaces, tree branches, wires, cables, or other sharp surfaces. Small tears will quickly lengthen and result in a flag that is tattered and torn.
