

The Adjudicators

Festival Adjudicator - Ron Cameron



Mr. Cameron is a professor of theatre, director, writer, adjudicator and workshop leader. Currently on sabbatical leave, he will return in the fall of 1995 to his work as Academic Co-ordinator for the Music Theatre Department at Sheridan College in Oakville, Ontario.

Mr. Cameron has directed numerous productions over the years for Sheridan College, for many community theatre groups throughout central Ontario, and for various regional summer theatres. Among his directing credits are *Meet Me in St. Louis, Black Comedy, The Fantasticks, Oklahoma!, Babes in Arms, Crimes of the Heart, A Midsummer Night's Dream,* and *A Chorus Line.*

In total, Mr. Cameron has adjudicated over 1,300 productions during the past twenty years. In addition, he has adjudicated for the American Association of Community Theatres at state and regional levels, and will be adjudicating the American National finals in Midland, Texas, in June 1995.

Mr. Cameron is also a writer and an associate editor with Simon & Pierre Publishers in Toronto. His textbook on acting technique, *Acting Skills for Life*, is in its second printing. The book combines acting technique exercises, improvisations, theory and excerpts from Canadian plays. He also has two scene study books in print.

Mr. Cameron graduated as a history major from the University of Western Ontario, and went on to train in theatre at the Banff Centre in Alberta, the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London (England) and the University of London.

Pre-Festival Adjudicator - Jane Carnwath



Jane Carnwath is a director, actor and teacher whose recent directing credits include *Twelve Angry Men* and *You Can't Take It With You* for the Music Theatre Program at Sheridan College, and *Camino Real* for George Brown College's Theatre School. For the Alumnae Theatre she directed Chekhov/Frayn's *Wild Honey* and *Eleemosynary*, by Lee Blessing. Recent projects include directing *The Madwoman of Chaillot*, as well as *Aimee*, her own stage adaptation of a CBC radio play on the life of Aimee Semple MacPherson, both for the Alumnae Theatre. She has directed *Jennie's Story* and Michel Tremblay's *En Pieces Detachees* for the York University Drama Department, and conducted workshops on acting and directing with community theatres

throughout Ontario. Until recently Jane was Program Director for the Alumnae Theatre. Currently she is a writer-director on R. Murray Schafer's ongoing project, *And Wolf Shall Inherit The Moon*, and Head of the Acting Discipline in the Music Theatre Program at Sheridan College, where she is at present in rehearsal for *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.


