Yet again I lead with a story of a police officer killed while on duty this time in Ontario on May 11th. Sgt. Eric Mueller was killed responding to a report of a gunshot on Laval Street in Bourget, about 50 kilometres east of downtown Ottawa. The report from the news media said one Ontario Provincial

Police (OPP) officer was shot dead, and two others injured, in what police are calling an "ambush" in the eastern Ontario community of Bourget in the municipality of Clarence-Rockland early Thursday morning. The



officer who was killed has been identified as Sgt. Eric Mueller, according to OPP Commissioner Thomas Carrique. "He is described by his colleagues as a coach and mentor," Carrique said at a news conference at the OPP Ottawa detachment that afternoon. "Somebody that everybody looked up to.

of Clarence-The mayor Rockland, Mario Zanth, said in an interview the community is trying to "support itself and each other." "You're always shocked when it happens everywhere else, but when it happens at home, it definitely hits a little harder," Zanth said. Bourget is about 50 kilometres east of downtown Ottawa.

Cyril wants people to know it's always about their personal challenges and he would NOT be responding to them with the motive of "preaching" at them.

If they understand this reality he can easily approach them if they contact him.

Cyril has an extensive network, so he is able to direct people to resources or handle their challenges "in-house" himself or whatever they choose.




Jerry Plastow, Past President:

The size of these wildfires was unprecedented, but our members rose to the challenge every day. I cannot express how proud I am of the work they have done, and continue to do, to ensure the safety and well-being of the communities they serve.
