

THE ADJUDICATOR

MAXWELL WRAY started his theatrical career as an actor at the famous Old Vic Theatre, playing over thirty-two Shakesperian roles. Later he became director of Sir Barry Jackson's famous Birmingham Repertory Theatre and while associated with this famous theatre, Mr. Wray gave Greer Garson her first engagement.

MAXWELL WRAY has produced many plays in the west end of London and in one of his plays Vivien Leigh was discovered. He has produced musical shows and pantomime and has worked for Sir Alexander Korda at the Den-



ham Studios. This past summer, Mr. Wray has been busy directing a touring production of "BLESS THE BRIDE" and has recently formed his own producing company which will start operations immediately on his return from Canada.

MAXWELL WRAY has considerable experience as an adjudicator for the British Drama League.

The Dominion Drama Festival Committee announces Michael St. Denis as adjudicator for the Dominion Drama Festival which will be held at the Grand Theatre, Calgary, Alberta, from May 8th to May 13th, 1950.

This will be the second Dominion Drama Festival for which Mr. St. Denis has acted as adjudicator, and all those who saw him in Ottawa will welcome the chance to hear the adjudications by this brilliant actor, director and producer.

Michael St. Denis is now director of the Old Vic Theatre School in London, England.

Section 14 — Dominion Drama Festival Regulations:

"Invitations to take part in the final Festival will be issued by and in the discretion of the Executive Committee having regard to the report of the regional adjudicator and the general standard of presentation across Canada. The group placed first in any regional festival by the regional adjudicator, will not necessarily be asked to compete in the final festival, and the Executive Committee in exercising its discretion, will proceed upon the underlying principle that the final festival should be representative of the best work produced in Canada without regard to regional divisions. This regulation is to be printed in the programme of every regional festival."


