THE EASTER LILY



The Easter Lily is a powerful symbol in Ireland and abroad. Representing peace, remembrance, and defiance, the symbol is still worn by many, including myself, to this day. Symbols of freedom are something that both Americans and Irishman embrace as acts of remembrance for people who died fighting for their country. The Easter Lily is no exception. With its colors of green, white, and orange, the Easter Lily has a long association with the Easter Rising of 1916.

The first Lily badges were designed in 1925 by the Republican women's organization, the Cumann na mBan. This women's organization also participated in the Rising of 1916. The original dual purpose of the Lily was to raise money for the Republican Prisoners Dependents Fund, and, to honor the sacrifices made by the men and women of the 1916 Rising. In 1926 the Easter Lily Commemoration Committee was formed. It continued until 1965. The original Lily badges were made by Republicans at great risk. Over the decades many have been harassed, arrested, and jailed. Traditionally sold outside Catholic Churches, these badges would be worn at Republican conventions.

In the early years of the Lily's existence, people from a broad spectrum wore the badge. From the Fianna Fail to Sinn Fein, to

the IRA and the Fianna Eireann proudly donned the badge keeping alive the memory of the men and women of the Easter Rising. Today, Republicans, Americans, and many abroad continue to honor the heroic sacrifices of 1916. Irish Republicans wear the Easter Lily to honor all those who have given their lives in the cause of Irish freedom in 1916, and, in every decade since.

The Easter Lily has become a national emblem that promotes the ideas of a united Ireland and peace. The Lily is a fitting symbol for Irish Nationalists. It blooms in springtime which coincides with the Rising. Its coloration of green, white, and orange mirror the Tri-Color. The green representing the ancient Celtic people, the orange the Protestant settlers, and the white the peace between. What can't be dismissed is the controversial connection of this badge has had to the IRA and Sinn Fein who continue to wear this symbol today.

Since the 1990's metal versions of the Lily became popular and are worn at any time during the year. The sale and usage of the Easter Lily badge has increased in recent times as the Troubles have settled down, Sinn Fein has gained electoral support, and, remembrance in the United States has increased. No longer associated with the terrorist wing of the IRA, the Easter Lily has become a symbol of freedom and remembrance. To this day the Cumann na mBan continues the sale of the Easter Lily as does Sinn Fein. I will continue to wear my badge to honor those brave

soldiers of Irish freedom and hope you'll do the same.

CELEBRATE THE SONG
"GRACE" IN THE MONTH
OF MAY 2020 IN KINGSTON**

This Irish ballad, written in 1985 by Frank and Seán O'Meara, tells the tragic story of Grace Gifford, who married her fiancé, rebel leader Joseph Mary Plunkett, in Dublin's notorious Kilmainham Gaol (Jail). Seven hours after their 15-minute wedding ceremony at

the gaol's austere chapel, Plunkett was executed by firing squad for his part in the 1916 Easter Rising in Dublin.

The best known version of "Grace" was recorded by Irish musician Jim McCann, which featured in the Irish charts for 36 weeks. A member of the folk group the Dubliners from 1974 until 1979, McCann made several television specials in his native country and achieving success with albums such as From Tara to Here and Grace & Other Irish Love Songs.

Rod Stewart first heard "Grace" being sung by Celtic supporters at the Scottish Cup final and was deeply moved. It fed into his love of the Glasgow football club and he decided to record the song for his Blood Red Roses album.

Stewart accepts that recording the Irish republican ballad might be seen by some as a controversial choice. "If you mean it's an IRA song, it isn't," he told The Independent. "They were the Irish freedom fighters then, but more importantly it's a great love song."

The idea that we are considering is to have an open invitation to the public to come to a location (as yet to be determined) in Kingston in May of 2020 to collectively sing this beautiful love song from long ago with tremendous historical significance. Springtime, love, Irish culture, Kingston!! This idea has potential!! Stay tuned for more information!!

HAVE YOU EVER HEARD OF BLOOM'S DAY?

From the festival's website in Ireland:

The Bloomsday Festival is an annual celebration of James Joyce's modernist epic Ulysses, the events of which take place in Dublin on 16 June 1904. The name is inspired by the main character Leopold Bloom. The first Bloomsday in Dublin took place in 1954 and was organised by a group of literary and cultural figures including Patrick Kavanagh, Brian O'Nolan, John Ryan and Anthony Cronin. The Bloomsday Festival has developed into a colourful and diverse celebration of Joyce and Ulysses. This world famous literary street carnival typically takes place from 11-16 June in Dublin, the heart of the Hibernian metropolis, the city that inspired Joyce and his major works.

People celebrate Bloomsday by dressing in the fashion of the period, eating food mentioned in the book, visiting the locations where the novel takes place and performing readings from the text.

The idea that we are in the process of considering is to have a "Mini Bloom's Day" celebration in Kingston, possibly combined with an existing Irish Cultural event that will serve to educate and entertain the audience about the great Irish Author and how his legacy is honored yearly in Ireland and all over the world. LIGHTER TOMATO “ALFREDO” PASTA BAKE

- Prep 55 MIN
- Total 1 HR 30 MIN
- Servings 8

A saucy pasta bake loaded with Italian sausage, tomato and Alfredo sauce, fusilli and melty mozzarella sounds delicious, but not particularly light—at least until now! This recipe was expressly designed to deliver on flavors of the dish that inspired it—crowd-favorite T... MORE+

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 cup chopped onions
1 tablespoon finely chopped garlic
1 ½ cups water
1 package (12 oz) frozen cauliflower flowerets
¾ cup heavy whipping cream
1 cup grated Parmesan cheese
¾ teaspoon salt
8 oz uncooked fusilli or rotini pasta (about 2 cups)
1 package (8 oz) white

mushrooms, cut into quarters
2 links (about 1/2 lbs.) Italian turkey sausage
1 cup chopped red or yellow bell pepper
1 can (28 oz) Muir Glen™ organic fire roasted crushed tomatoes, undrained
¾ cup shredded mozzarella cheese (3 oz)
2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil

Steps

1 Heat oven to 350°F. Spray 13x9-inch (3-quart) glass baking dish with cooking spray.
2 In 3-quart saucepan, heat 1 teaspoon of the oil over medium heat. Add onions and 1 teaspoon of the garlic; cook 5 to 6 minutes or until just tender. Transfer to blender. Return saucepan to medium heat; add water and frozen cauliflower. Increase heat to medium-high; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to medium-low; cover and cook 3 to 4 minutes or until tender. Drain and transfer cauliflower to blender; cool 10 minutes. Add whipping cream; cover and blend 60 to 90 seconds or until nearly smooth. Add Parmesan cheese and 1/2 teaspoon of the salt; blend 60 to 90 seconds or until smooth.



3 Cook and drain pasta as directed on package. Add to baking dish.
4 Meanwhile, in 12-inch nonstick skillet, heat remaining 2 teaspoons oil over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Cut sausage casing, and discard. Crumble sausage into skillet with mushrooms. Cook 8 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to break up sausage, until sausage is no longer pink. Stir in bell pepper and remaining 2 teaspoons garlic; cook 1 to 2 minutes or until garlic is fragrant. Stir in tomatoes; heat 3 to 4 minutes or until heated through.



5 Add sausage mixture to baking dish; stir to completely combine. Top with mozzarella cheese; carefully pour cauliflower sauce over top. Bake uncovered 30 to 35 minutes or until bubbly on edges.



6 Let stand 10 minutes. Top with basil.
