

# Festival Adjudicator

VIRGINIA REH first became actively involved in theatre performing with a local community theatre company in New York. While still in high school, she won a scholarship to study acting in French at New York's Centre d'art dramatique.

MS. REH continued her studies in acting and directing at the University of California, Berkeley, where she received her B.A. and M.A. degrees. This was followed by two-years of post-graduate research and study in theatre and directing.

Since moving to Canada in 1971, VIRGINIA REH has been active in a wide range of theatre work, including directing, acting, teaching, casting consultation and all areas of production and administration. As Artistic Director of the Gryphon Theatre, last summer MS. REH directed three productions and starred in Chapter Two.

MS. REH's acting career has involved principal roles in more than 70 productions of plays by writers as varied as Coward, Shaw, Neil Simon, Pirandello, Molière and Woody Allen, in such centre as New York, Berkeley, Edmonton, Toronto and Niagara-on-the-Lake. She has directed plays, musicals, operas and revues in a number of cities, including Toronto, Edmonton, Vancouver and Portland.

MS. REH began teaching at the University of California. More recently, she taught acting in the Opera Training Programme of the Banff Centre School of Fine Arts, the Opera Division of the University of Toronto, and at Couchiching Music Theatre. This summer MS. REH returns to Theatre Ontario's Summer Courses to teach Directing. Last May, MS. REH adjudicated the finals of the Theatre Ontario Festival in Sudbury.

# Preliminary Adjudicator

John Wright brings almost 30 years of experience to his role of Preliminary Adjudicator. In Canada, he began with the Barn Players in Toronto and the St. John Players in Peterborough.

Since moving to the Kitchener-Waterloo area in 1962, John has served in every production capacity, including acting, directing, play polishing and as president of Kitchener-Waterloo Little Theatre.



Recent successful directing endeavors include "The Fantastiks" and "Plaza Suite" (1982), "How the Other Half Loves" and "Shadow Box" (1981) and "Solitaire" (1980). Last year John was play polisher for the Elora Community Theatre's production of "The Glass Menagerie". He is director of Guelph Little Theatre's last play of the season "Chapter Two", already in production.

Since the fall, John has travelled throughout Western Ontario, selecting plays for this year's Festival. We hope you enjoy his choices.



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
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
