BEIRUT EXPLOSION

- Canadian Foodgrains Bank members raise more than \$2.1 million for Beirut Explosion relief
- ACT Alliance response will work with Beirut churches

In the wake of the explosion in the port of Beirut, Lebanon on August 4, the international community responded with an outpouring of donations. Donations made before August 24 to Canada's <u>Humanitarian Coalition</u>, an organization of 12 relief organizations including the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, were matched 1:1 by the Government of Canada. More than \$8 million was raised by this appeal to date. Through its membership in the Foodgrains Bank, PWRDF donations will also be matched. PWRDF donors gave \$109,000, helping the Foodgrains Bank contribute approximately \$2.1 million, representing 25% of the funds raised for the Humanitarian Coalition.

The government of Canada will match every dollar donated by individuals to the Humanitarian Coalition and its members between August 4 and August 24, up to a maximum of \$5 million. Donations to PWRDF marked for the Beirut explosion emergency response will be matched.
