The Festival

The Dominion Drama Festival was inaugurated by the initiative of His Excellency the Right Honourable, the Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of Canada, in October, 1932. (The operation of the Festival was discontinued during World War II.)

The Festival, which functions under a Royal Charter, was first held in Ottawa in April, 1933, and has since become a national institution which commends widespread interest and recognition.

In 1960, the Festival was favoured with the major sponsorship of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, an organization which shares the Festival's interest in the dramatic art.

Following the system of grouping Canada's fourteen regions into eight zones, as established in 1959, the Governors of the Dominion Drama Festival once again have retained the services of Canadians to adjudicate the regional festivals and to select the winning play of each zone. These eight winners will be invited to participate in the Final Festival which will be held May 13-18, 1963, in Kitchener.

REGIONAL ADJUDICATOR BIOGRAPHY 1963

Mr Herbert Whittaker



Although best known as the drama critic for Toronto's "Globe and Mail," Mr. Whittaker has directed on a professional basis for amateur and Little Theatre groups for many years.

He was educated at the Strathcona Academy and l'Ecole des Beaux Arts, Montreal and started his career as a drama critic with The Gazette, Montreal. He also has reviewed for The N.Y. Times, The N.Y. Herald-Tribune, The Christian Science Monitor; he has been contributor to the Culture of Canada (Cornell University), The Saturday Review, Arts, Encyclopaedia Americana and is the author of the Stratford Festival (Canada) 1953-1958.

Mr. Whittaker has directed the following plays, "Galileo," "Uncle Vanya", "The Family Reunion", "The Dybbuk", "Electra" (Giraudoux), "The Lady's Not For Burning", "The Glass Menagerie", "In Good King Charles Golden Days." He has twice been awarded the Louis Jouvet Trophy for best director, also the Sir Barry Jackson Trophy, the Martha Allan Trophy and the Bessborough Trophy, all of which are awarded annually at DDF Festival. He has been a Governor of the Festival and a member of its National Executive for many years. He holds the Canadian Drama Award. He designed the costumes and settings for the Canadian Players' 1962 production of "King Lear". He has adjudicated provincial drama festivals in various provinces.

THE radio and television member stations of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters (l'Association Canadienne des Radiodiffuseurs) have aided drama groups at the community level for many years.

FESTIVAL PLAY DIRECTORS

RAY LAWLOR — Players' Guild of Hamilton Inc.

A director from the demanding world of professional theatre, Mr. Lawlor was first associated with the Players' Guild when he guest-directed "Caesar and Cleopatra" last season.

Mr. Lawlor has been active for over twelve years in Toronto theatrical circles in many varying roles — those of actor, stage manager, director and teacher.

Trained at the Canadian Theatre School, Toronto, he travelled to Paris to study mime under masters Marcel Marceau and Pierre Sonnier. Back in Canada, he studied voice with Sterndale Bennett and C. S. Baker of the Conservatory of Music, Toronto, and acting with Al Saxe, also of Toronto.

As an actor he has appeared with many groups in Toronto, and has undertaken leading roles in such plays as "The Iceman Cometh", "Desire Under the Elms", "The Master Builder", "Twelfth Night", "John Gabriel Borkman" and "Shadow and Substance".

He has most recently founded the Theatre in the \mbox{Dell} in Toronto, directing and producing all the shows there.

A veteran of FIRST PERSON, GENERAL MOTORS THEATRE and other CBC productions on TV, Mr. Lawlor has just finished two TV appearances on PLAYDATE, the latest being in "The Devil's Instrument".

MORRIS KIRK—Sarnia Drama League

Morris Kirk — attended the "Theatre of Action" school and was affiliated with the Jewish Little Theatre in his native Toronto. He received honorable mention, playing the role of Moe Axlerod in the Dominion Drama Festival entry "Awake and Sing". Since coming to Sarnia, he has appeared as an actor in "The Shop at Sly Corner," "The Two Mrs. Carols," "The Lady's Not for Burning" and "Squaring The Circle," and has directed "My Three Angels" and "Rise and Shine," which swept all honours at the Goderich One Act Play Festival.

BLANCH HOGG-Kitchener-Waterloo Little Theatre

Blanch Hogg is the director of the Kitchener-Waterloo production of "The Enchanted". Her background includes six years on and off Broadway and six years in England. She directed London Little Theatre's 1948 award winning St. Joan, and won the Bessborough Trophy as best supporting actress in the 1957 D.D.F. In 1958, Mrs. Hogg was the Preliminary Adjudicator for the W.O.D.L. and has been a member of the executive of both W.O.D.L. and C.O.D.L. She is a member of the D.D.F. Executive Committee, Vice-Chairman of the Christian Drama Council, and Director with the Company of Pilgrims in Toronto

JACQUELINE KENNEDY—Owen Sound Little Theatre

Jacqueline Kennedy is the Director of the Owen Sound Little Theatre Festival entry, "The Deep Blue Sea". Miss Kennedy is also an actress, having played the part of Gran in "Whiteoaks" and played Abby in "Aresnic and Old Lace" which she also directed.

Since last year, when she directed Owen Sound Little Theatre Festival entry, Miss-Kennedy has had the opportunity to attend a seminar in advanced directing which was conducted by Dr. Schneiderman.

PETER DEARING—London Little Theatre

Peter Dearing is the executive director of the L.L.T. His production of "Six Characters in Search of An Author" won the Calvert Trophy at the Vancouver D.D.F. as well as best actress and best supporting player.


