Owen Sound is renowned for its hospitality throughout Western Ontario. We will be working all this week to ensure that our reputation is well deserved. Please help us!



FESTIVAL ADJUDICATOR

Frank works as director, actor, writer and teacher. He has recently been seen on such series as Street Legal and Top Cops in addition to the film version of Car 54, Where are You? . Not forgetting his roots in legitimate theatre, he also starred as the detective in the murder mystery series at Toronto's Royal York Hotel.

He has directed plays of virtually every period and style, from Greek tragedy to experimental theatre. These include productions in French, Spanish, and Sign Language. His current passion is film and video. He has received a Canada Council Grant and commissions for his scripts, including a new play for Welland Little Theatre. He would like to repeat this experience with other groups.

Mr. Canino has taught and adjudicated extensively for Theatre Ontario who have provided a grant for his services on this occasion.


