WESTERN ONTARIO DRAMA LEAGUE FESTIVAL, 1934

Rules and Regulations Governing Adjudication and Presentation

1. The general rules laid down by the Dominion Drama Festival Committee governing adjudications at regional Festivals are as follows:

The basis of adjudication at the regional Festivals will be as follows:

(a) Fifty (50) marks will be allotted for the "general level of acting," including, with reference to the individual actors, characterization, audibility of speech, variation of tone, emphasis, gesture and movement.

Note—As to "general level": If two groups present scenes with six characters in each, two parts being in the one case played to perfection and four badly and, in the other case, all six parts being played with average ability, the adjudication will favour the average and smoother performance.

(b) Thirty-five (35) marks will be allotted to *production*, including the interpretation of the spirit and meaning of the play or scene, team-work, tempo and its variation, grouping and movement, the making of points and success in securing a sense of climax.

Note—Account will, in the adjudication, be taken of the greater difficulty of securing desired effects when the play or scene requires a large cast.

(c) Fifteen (15) marks will be allotted for stage presentation, including stage setting, properties, lighting, costumes and make-up.

Note—The setting and lighting should be such as to indicate what the producer would achieve under ideal conditions; in the adjudication, importance will be attached to touches of detail in the setting which give atmosphere to the production and to indications of the value of lighting apart from its use merely as a means of obtaining visibility. The appropriateness of costumes and make-up to the characters and the play will be taken into consideration and regard will be had to the manner in which the costumes have been designed and made; richness of material and other indications of unnecessary expenditures, such as the hiring of costumes, will not be favourably regarded.

2. Attention is called to the ruling that plays must be presented within or before curtains with simplified indicative scenery only.
