

The Western Ontario Drama League

The Western Ontario Drama League was organized in 1932 for the purpose of furthering the cause of the little theatre movement in Western Ontario and of acting as the committee in charge of the regional competition of the Dominion Drama Festival each year. The W.O.D.L. has not confined its activities to the yearly festivals but has tried to give leadership and assistance to the many active producing groups in Western Ontario.

The Western Ontario Drama League regretted the decision of the Dominion Drama Festival executive to suspend its activities and cancel the final and regional festivals during the war. It felt that for the time being at least, there was a place not only for the regular yearly productions of the various groups, but also for the yearly festivals.

The W.O.D.L. is proud of the manner in which its member groups have, under many difficulties, carried on their regular yearly programmes and assisted in raising funds for patriotic purposes, provided entertainment for the troops and helped mantain the morale of the people at home. The W.O.D.L. executive thought it also should render what service it could by continuing to give leadership to its member groups and by helping to keep alive the interest which had been aroused and the spirit which had been enthused into the whole movement in the last seven years.

The W.O.D.L. decided to carry on and meet the situation by making whatever changes were required from time to time and it has been able to carry out its usual system of preliminary performances and arrange for a Western Ontario festival upon a reduced scale. Each year whatever changes are required will be made and it is the policy of the W.O.D.L., if at all possible, to keep its organization intact in the trying years ahead and to continue to render service and give that assistance and leadership so urgently needed.

The W.O.D.L. pays tribute to its many executive members and enthusiastic workers who are now in the Canadian forces at home and abroad. The remaining members of the executive felt that their places should not be filled for this year and have shouldered the extra work involved. The W.O.D.L. was fortunate in having as its president this year, Mr. Ernest Reynolds, whose tireless energy and enthusiasm has carried the organization over a difficult period and added another successful year to its history.

The plays being presented at this festival were selected from 19 plays which were given by the W.O.D.L. groups in the preliminary performances. Mr. Cameron Matthews of Toronto, distinguished actor, producer and adjudicator, was present at the preliminary performances and will act as adjudicator at this festival. Mr. Matthews has had a long and successful career upon the stage and his knowledge, ability and great desire to be of assistance were of inestimable value to the W.O.D.L. groups.



A PRIZE OF \$50.00

A prize of \$50.00 given annually by the W.O.D.L. Executive for the best play, judged as a dramatic composition, written by a person resident in Western Ontario. Originally the play had to be presented in the W.O.D.L. Festival or preliminary performances and the prize was divided between the author and the group presenting the play. 1936, W. Eric Harris, Sarnia and the London Little Theatre. 1937, Herbert J. Bassett, Galt, and the Galt Players. 1938, Phyllis C. Stratford, Sarnia. 1939, Hilda M. Smith, London. (This prize was withdrawn for 1940.)
