

FESTIVAL ADJUDICATOR



RON CAMERON is a teacher of theatre, director, writer, adjudicator and workshop leader. He graduated as a history major from the University of Western Ontario in 1966. From there he went on to train in theatre at Banff School of Fine Arts, the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London(England) and the University of London. Since 1975, he has taught acting in the Music and Theatre Department at Sheridan College in Oakville, Ontario, where he is now Senior Academic Co-ordinator for the department.

Mr. Cameron has directed numerous productions over the years for Sheridan College, for many community theatre groups throughout central Ontario, and for various regional summer theatres. Among his most recent directing credits are "The Fantastics", "Oklahoma!", "Babes in Arms", "Crimes of the Heart", "A Midsummer Night's Dream", and "A Chorus Line."

For fourteen consecutive years he has taught acting at Theatre Ontario's successful Summer Courses. In August 1986, he inaugurated Theatre Ontario's Youth Theatre Summer Course, a week-long intensive course for teenagers offering a choice in performance or technical studies.

His textbook on acting technique, <u>Acting Skills for Life</u>, was published in late 1989 by Simon & Pierre Publishers, Toronto, and is already in its second printing. The book combines acting technique exercises, improvisations, theory and excerpts from Canadian plays. He is currently an editor for Simon & Pierre, with whom he is planning a multi-volume series of theatre resource books for primary and secondary school levels.

PRELIMINARY ADJUDICATOR

Since KAY McKIE last adjudicated for W.O.D.L. in 1988-89, she has adjudicated the E.O.D.L. Festival and the Musical Productions for the A.C.T.C.O. Festival. After many years of adjudicating Sears' District Festivals, this year Kay will be busy for five weeks as the Sears' Regional Adjudicator.

You may have met Kay during play-polishing weekends or directing workshops funded through Theatre Ontario's Talent Bank. Or perhaps she welcomed you at the Theatre Ontario Summer Courses, as one of Kay's favorite activities has been her long-term participation with Theatre Ontario's summer courses committee.

As the Preliminary Adjudicator for this year's W.O.D.L. Festival, Kay began her road trips in October and has enjoyed the privilege of seeing every group's play in their "home" space with their local audience. Every visit was warm and festive, building on Western Ontario's reputation for hospitality.



Kay hopes that this week's shows have aged well and mastered the technical hurdle of adapting to the festival space, so that you may enjoy five of the fine productions that graced her travels.






