### 1961 Festival Adjudicator



JAMES E. DEAN

James E. Dean, adjudicator for this year's Drama Festival, has for 30 years been active in all phases of Canadian theatre. He has been a successful director and one of the country's best adjudicators, a tireless worker whose contribution has been invaluable. He was a founder of the Province of Ontario Drama Library; founded the Playcraftsmen, a leading Toronto amateur company; founded the One-Act Play Festival; lectured in various parts of Ontario, including a lecture series at the University of Toronto, and organized the Canadian Guild of Drama Adjudicators.

Adjudication is one of the most interesting and enjoyable features of the Festival. The audience is cordially invited to remain after curtain to hear Mr. Dean.

The Canadian Association of Broadcasters, through contributions from many member stations, is this year sponsoring the Dominion Drama Festival. The C.A.B. represents 163 privately-owned radio stations and 49 privately-owned television stations across Canada.

The Canadian Association of Broadcasters was formed in 1926 to assist private stations in providing better service to their communities. Public service programming ideas are pooled. Special programmes such as the Report from Parliament Hill series and the Teen Age Book Parade are underwritten. In other words, the C.A.B. helps its member stations meet their responsibility to radio listeners and television viewers for the dissemination of information and news plus entertainment designed to meet the various tastes of listeners.

Privately-owned radio and television has discovered and developed some of the brightest stars in the Canadian entertainment field. The sponsorship of the Dominion Drama Festival by many of its member stations this year is another step in the C.A.B.'s encouragement of Canadian talent.
