At our November General/Dinner Meeting, we were fortunate to have the Executive Director from Legacy Place, Diana Festejo, as our Guest Speaker. We learned Legacy Place is where first-responders can turn to for assistance. The following was provided by Diana and capitalizes her presentation:



Last month, Legacy Place Society (a not-for-profit registered charity) shared a bit about the organization at the Edmonton RCMP Vets sweater dinner. It's an intriguing resource that's available to those serving or retired as law enforcement, emergency medical/fire services, 911 dispatch, veterans and military personnel. Primarily based in Alberta since 1998, Legacy Place has provided significant support through its means of a confidential phone line, shelter houses in Calgary, Edmonton and Red Deer and a wide range of education partnerships on marriage, mental health and strengthening family relationships. The very nature of the daily work as a first responder can create emotional and physical havoc and the vicarious trauma, PTSD, operational or occupational stress injuries can become major stressors on the individual and their family. The psychological and physiological demands accumulate over time due to the multiple

exposures to the job demands.

Often what is faced as a family as they try to understand and be supportive during recovery while maintaining family stability is a wide variety of challenges. Legacy Place does not replace employee assistance programs or professional medical counsel.

What defines Legacy Place is how they work as a bridge of supportive possibilities between the individual, their place of work and their families.

Whether its through a phone call to it's confidential help line, or while an individual is staying at one of the Legacy Place Houses or during it's education partnerships, life changing experiences happen. Legacy Place promotes a shared responsibility approach that encourages the individuals and families to steer themselves through the everyday adversity, reframe the difficult realities of the profession and to encourage daily behaviors that are conducive to re-charge and re-engage with themselves, their families and work place.

RCMP members and Veterans are frequent clients within the Legacy Place Houses. They might

be in town for a medical procedure or require use of the house due to safety, relationship breakdowns or general respite due to personal circumstances on the home front.



George also presented a beautiful, framed print to a very surprised, grateful and most deserving Cyril Gowler!

Late last month, Tom Burkett, our Membership Coordinator received a "New Member Sign Up" notification from National's Membership Administrator. However, the Regimental number on this application was "17530". Then shortly after

receiving this message Tom received this heart-warming message from the person who made the application on behalf of her husband. With her permission, this is the slightly modified message:

Hello, and thank you for considering my husband Ed for membership. He turned 90 this past September and he will be tickled pink if his application goes through.

If possible I am asking this be expedited so it can be my Christmas present to him, and I can give him some kind of letter you might send (?) by mail (we don't have a printer for an email) that I can give to him as a "physical" present, and proof of his membership. I know there is less than a month until Christmas — I am sorry for applying so late; I just learned of your organization, and then briefly thought he wouldn't be accepted until I spoke by phone to Glen Siegersma just now and he explained Ed does not need to have had 5 years' service.

Ed joined when he was 18 in Feb of '52. He was a "Constable 3rd Class Under 21", then was eventually promoted to Constable. He trained at Regina, then was posted to Winnipeg. He applied to go up north and was sent to Edmonton for "northern training," then was transferred to Fort Smith, NWT, where he served the majority of his time.

In Fort Smith Ed met Dorothy Cummins, and they got married a week after he turned 21 (and got her father's permission). This was against the rules: members had to have permission also of the RCMP and, apparently, \$1200 in the bank! Difficult to come up with on a 3rd Class Constable Under 21 on a salary of around \$130.00 (that was with northern pay) a month.

About two months after they were married Ed decided he had to tell his superior officer. He was fired a week later, although they asked him to stay until the new member arrived. He received a dishonourable discharge, something I am going to pursue having changed, and given \$30 of his superannuation. The rest, \$300, was taken as a fine for breaking the rules.

Ed and Dot were married for 63 years until she passed away in 2017. They farmed near Fawcett, AB and Dapp Corners, and Ed also built houses to make ends meet. They had 8 children, all of whom are grown and survive to this day, and an infinite number of dogs.

I am Ed's second wife and we moved off the farm last year to live in town (Westlock). We live very modestly with (quess what!) two small dogs and no money. But we are happy; Ed is proud of his history with the RCMP, and I also worked for several years in Justice (Territorial Women's Correctional Centre, also in Fort Smith). Ed is a very good man, fair, honest, and a loving dad and husband.

I am very much looking forward to us receiving The Quarterly Magazine, and will contact them for some back issues. This is a surprise for him, and I know he will be over the moon when it is all, hopefully, arranged (and, fingers crossed, maybe by Christmas!). Cyril wants people to know it's always about their personal challenges and he would NOT be responding to them with the motive of "preaching" at them.

If they understand this reality he can easily approach them if they contact him.

Cyril has an extensive network, so he is able to direct people to resources or handle their challenges "in-house" himself or whatever they choose.

Community Safety and Well-being Branch hold auto theft prevention information session and steering wheel lock giveaway for Coaldale residents

In a proactive effort to address rising concerns around auto theft in the community, S/Sgt. Luke Halvorsen and Crime Prevention Liaison Carolyn McTighe from the Community Safety and Well-being branch, hosted an information session and steering wheel lock giveaway event to provide community members with preventative tips to help keep their vehicles safe. The event was held at the Coaldale Sportsplex and garnered a great deal of community interest, with an impressive turnout of over 150 concerned residents.

The event provided residents with valuable insights on the current trends in auto theft, preventative measures, and community safety collaboration. Attendees had the opportunity to interact with S/Sgt. Halvorsen, gaining firsthand knowledge on how to enhance security measures for their vehicles.



The distribution of anti-theft clubs to attendees was a highlight of the event. These clubs, designed to deter potential thefts, were in such high demand that the entire supply was gone within the first 10 minutes of the event, underscoring the community's eagerness to actively participate in crime prevention.

"I heard about the event and thought this was a great thing to be having in the community," said a long time Coaldale resident. "The chance to pick up a club and know that I am doing something to



secure my vehicle, is really important."

The Coaldale auto theft info session marks a collaborative effort between law enforcement and the community to address and prevent criminal activities. As a successful initiative, it sets a positive precedent for future engagements of a similar nature and speaks volumes about the collective effort and power of community involvement.
