






Dwight George Scott, 1941-2016

Dwight George Scott, age 74, of Riverview, passed away on Tuesday, May 24, 2016, at the Dr. George-L.-Dumont University Hospital Centre.

May 18th, ASHRAE's Headquarters Renovation "What Happens When the Leaders Try to Do it Right"

ASHRAE recently dedicated a complete renovation of its headquarters building in Atlanta. The renovations targeted achieving LEEDTM NC Gold as well as LEEDTM EB Gold levels of performance. The renovation project also sought to create a sustainable building that demonstrated various HVAC technologies and also served as a Living Laboratory for the use of its members. The presentation focused on the design and construction process, the systems installed in the building and preliminary building performance results. They reviewed what worked and what were some of the major surprises that occurred.

May 19th, Advanced Energy Design Guides "Going Beyond Minimum Standards"

The Advanced Energy Design Guide (AEDG) series of documents is one of the most popular in ASHRAE's history with well over 500,000 copies in circulation. Focused on providing clear guidance for achieving 30% and 50% energy savings in smaller commercial buildings, the AEDGs meet the need for a large number of projects where project budgets and design professionals might be in short supply. The presenter chaired the initial AEDG for small offices as well as two additional guides and offered perspective on the partnership that contributed to the guides, the intent of the guides and how practitioners can apply the guides.

Service Hot Water Measurements by Robert Hoadley, P. Eng, and Ben Roundell, EIT

Chapter 50 of the 2015 ASHRAE Handbook – HVAC Applications deals with Service Water Heating. Table 6 of this Chapter provides the following data for service hot water consumption at hotels, of varying size:

Number of Units	Max. Hourly Demand	Max. Daily Demand	Avg. Daily Demand
20 or less	6.0 USGal/unit	35.0 USGal/unit	20.0 USGal/unit
60	5.0 USGal/unit	25.0 USGal/unit	14.0 USGal/unit
100 or more	4.0 USGal/unit	15.0 USGal/unit	10.0 USGal/unit

Chapter members Robert Hoadley & Ben Roundell have been measuring hot water consumption at a large (100+ bed) hotel in Fredericton, NB. The hotel is served by two 750 USGal (2,835 L) storage tanks with common cold water inlet and hot water outlets. A recirculation pump injects domestic hot water return into the common cold water inlet. A magnetic-type water meter was placed upstream of the DHWR inlet to capture the flow of cold water make-up into the tanks.

The flow numbers measured were found to be slightly higher than the rules of thumb published in the HVAC Applications handbook. Daily hot water consumption ranges from 16.0-21.1 USGal/unit. These values were measured with the hotel 70% or more occupied. The days with full occupancy at the hotel measured 20.2 and 21.1 USGal/unit. If we correct our data to reflect gallons per unit occupied at the hotel, the range of measured values becomes 20.2 to 23.3 USGal/occupied bed per day.

Flow was also measured at 5-minute intervals on several mornings to determine the maximum hourly demand. The maximum demand was found to occur between 6:30AM and 7:30AM. The calculated maximum load of 3.1 USGal/hour per unit was lower than the rule of thumb published in HVAC Applications. Table 6 is noted to have been calculated prior to the introduction of low-flow fixtures. We attribute our lower maximum hourly demand to the low flow fixtures installed by the hotel in a previous renovation. Further research by ASHRAE is likely warranted given the prevalence of lower-flow plumbing fixtures in contemporary construction.

Our measurements have been generally consistent with the rules of thumb published in the 2015 ASHRAE Handbook – HVAC Applications. While our maximum hourly demand was lower than the tabulated values, our maximum daily demand was higher. We are recommending ASHRAE update the service hot water data to better account for low flow fixtures. We also believe ASHRAE should modify the values from a per unit basis to an occupancy or per bed basis.







ASHRAE Certification

BEAP - Building Energy Assessment Professional

BEMP - Building Energy Modeling Professional

CPMP - Commissioning Process Management Professional

HFDP - Healthcare Facility Design Professional

HBDP - High-Performance Building Design Professional

OPMP – Operations and Performance Management Professional

Each certification program consists of a proctored exam following a course of self-study. ASHRAE recommends several texts and standards as knowledge bases for each certification exam. It is also expected that a candidate's career history will provide a large part of their knowledge base for the exam. Certified professionals are required to maintain their certification through professional development and retesting.

Members interested in these certifications should visit ashrae.org/certification for more information on the certification, the exam process, and the re-certification process. ASHRAE also maintains a database of all certified professionals on the website.


