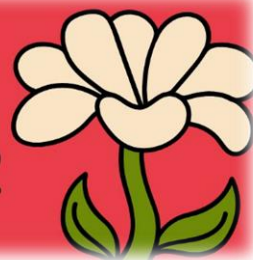

### ***Government hits Canada Life with financial sanctions***

*The federal government has begun imposing financial sanctions on Canada Life after months of outcry from public servants, retirees and their families who were left fighting for medical claims to be covered.*

*Public Services and Procurement Canada (PSPC) said it "is taking steps to address startup delays faced by Canada Life and has begun to apply financial consequence mechanisms under the contract," according to a statement from spokesperson Michèle LaRose.*

Ralph and Edna were both patients in a mental hospital. One day while they were walking past the hospital swimming pool, Ralph suddenly jumped into the deep end. He sank to the bottom of the pool and stayed there. Edna promptly jumped in to save him. She swam to the bottom and pulled him out.

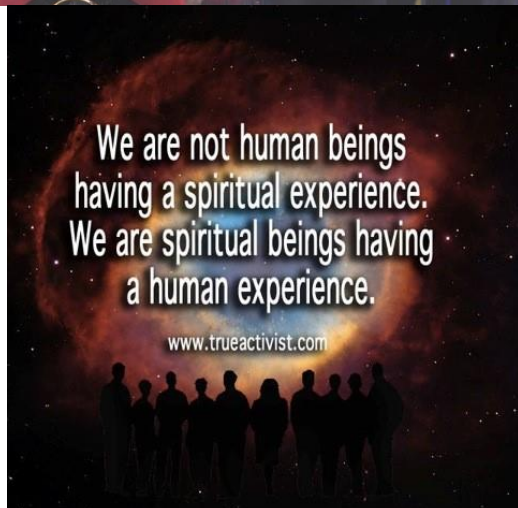

## National Public Safety Telecommunicator Week

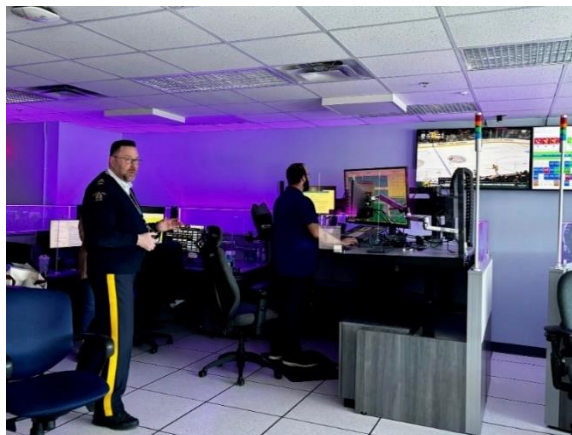
April 14-20 was National Public Safety Telecommunicator Week.

Every day, the individuals in our Operational Call Centres work behind the scenes to ensure the safety of our communities and the well-being of our frontline members.

The work of our operators often goes unseen, but their impact is immeasurable. When Albertans call during their time of need, operators are there on the other end of the line to listen, reassure, and coordinate the necessary response to any crisis. Their compassion and professionalism make a profound difference not only in the lives of those they serve, but also in the work of our responding members. Our operators play a vital role in assisting members during difficult situations. They provide support and guidance to our officers in the field, dispatching members, performing on the spot record checks, and checking in on members to ensure they are safe.

On top of being a complex and stressful job, our OCC operators are busy. Our operation centres are manned 24 hours a day, every day, all year round. In 2023, even while short-staffed, the OCC took over 675,000 calls and created more than 350,000 files.

We recognize the contributions of our operators and thank them for their service and commitment to keeping our communities safe.





### Olds RCMP charge three with firearms and drug offences

On March 19, Olds RCMP received information from the public that a rural property located within Mountain View County was being used as a base of operations to sell drugs and house stolen property and firearms. After an investigation, a search warrant was obtained for the residence.

On April 3, 2024, Emergency Response Teams (North and South), and Olds RCMP, executed the search warrant. As a result of the search warrant, the following was seized:

- 200 grams of suspected cocaine
- 2 grams of suspected amphetamine
- 250 Gabapentin pills
- 8 cartons of contraband cigarettes
- 7 firearms and 200 rounds of ammunition
- A stolen Dodge Ram 2500
- 2 stolen utility trailers

Three individuals of Mountain View County were apprehended, and all together were charged with 25 charges



### Drumheller RCMP and partners execute drug search warrant

In May of 2023, a prison drug trafficking operation was dismantled following a complex investigation led by Drumheller RCMP General Investigative Services (GIS). Several drones and a large amount of cocaine, methamphetamine, and fentanyl were seized, and two suspects were charged, including one inmate. The investigation continued and RCMP identified a suspect and a suspect inmate who were facilitating the introduction of drugs and phones into the Drumheller Institution via illicit drone flights. On March 15, 2024, police executed a search warrant at a residence in Eckville, Alta. As a result of the search warrant, the following was seized:

- 1.3 Kilograms of Cocaine
- 2.2 Kilograms of Methamphetamine;
- 2.1 grams of Fentanyl
- Canadian Currency and a money counter
- Two Prohibited Weapons
- Two drones
- Cell Phones
- A loaded shotgun
- Break in instruments
- A 2020 Dodge Ram 2500 a 2018 GMC Yukon.

Throughout the investigation, multiple RCMP Support Units were engaged including Sylvan Lake General Duty officers, Sylvan Lake GIS, Blackfalds GIS, Digital Forensic Services Unit; Forensic Identification Section (FIS), Special Operations, and more. Also engaged were key partners including Edmonton ALERT Auto Crimes Unit and Drumheller Institution.

As a result of this operation, RCMP have laid numerous charges. Drumheller RCMP and partners continue to investigate this matter and additional charges are pending.



“This was a lengthy and meticulous investigation resulting in the removal of illicit and harmful drugs and weapons from our communities,” said S/Sgt. Robert Harms of Drumheller RCMP stated. “This is yet another example of numerous RCMP Units and our valued partners working together to ensure safe and secure communities.”

#### **Peace Regional RCMP respond to wildfire**

On April 23, at approximately 1:30 p.m., Peace Regional RCMP responded to a wildfire in the area of Highway 684, near Shaftsbury Trail and Bricks Hill.

RCMP members immediately went to action, attending all homes most directly affected in efforts of evacuation. Peace Regional RCMP requested the assistance of the Rural Alberta Provincial Integrated Defence Response (RAPID) program; with the approval of the RAPID program, Alberta Sheriffs, Fish and Wildlife came to assist. Additionally, assistance was received by Alberta Forestry, Correctional Officers, Alberta Forestry, Peace River Fire Department, St. Isador Fire Department, Grimshaw Fire Department, Fairview Fire Department, water bombers and helicopters assisted with scene containment, evacuation efforts, fire suppression and more.

The RCMP provided members from Grande Prairie Traffic Unit, Western Alberta Districts Crime Reduction Unit, Western Alberta Districts General Investigation Services, Manning RCMP, Fairview RCMP, McLennan RCMP, K Divisions Remotely Piloted Aircraft System, and Alberta’s Tactical Support Group which deploys members from all over the province to assist in major events.

With the fires getting closer to Peace Regional Correctional Centre, Peace Regional RCMP contacted the Peace River School Division, requesting buses to

proactively

transport 174 inmates in the facility to safety. Peace Regional RCMP would like to extend their appreciation to the quick response from Peace River School Division in providing buses, and especially to all of the bus drivers who went above and beyond their duties to aid in the evacuation of inmates.

Peace Regional RCMP then assisted by escorting transportation buses to RCMP detachments such as Peace Regional, Valleyview, High Prairie, Slave Lake, Lakeshore, Spirit River, where inmates were temporarily held until transfer could be made to other remand centres around the province. RCMP have also assisted with providing members to maintain guarding of these prisoners where Correctional Officers were unable to remain.

Peace Regional RCMP would also like to extend appreciation to the quick evacuation responses of community members in the area, assistance by local farmers, and to all emergency services who assisted in fire fighting efforts.





### Red Dress Day

May 5 was Red Dress Day. Each year, red dresses are worn or displayed outside homes and workplaces throughout the country as a symbol of hope and to raise awareness for the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls across Canada.

We honour the memories of the women, girls, and Two Spirit people who remain missing, and we mourn with the loved ones of the mothers, daughters, sisters, and aunts who will sadly never come home.

The RCMP's history with Indigenous communities is long and complex. While we cannot change the failures and shortcomings of our past, we must strive for a better future by ensuring we never forget the lives of those lost. We remain dedicated to serving Indigenous communities, to working with them, and to never stopping in the pursuit of bringing home missing women and girls. It is only through our shared commitment that we can bring justice and closure to their families and loved ones.
