Upcoming Workshops and Classes

Cable Knitting ~ Wednesday, April 12, 2023

Elizabeth Schoenthal will be teaching us cable knitting. Cable knitting is achieved by moving a stitch or multiple stitches to a new position in the stitch count to produce a twisted or braided structure in the fabric. This class will teach the fundamentals of cable knitting, how to read cable charts, and some tips for designing your own cables. You should have basic knowledge of knitting to attend; such as casting on, casting off, knitting, and purling.

Please bring with you a pair of knitting needles (e.g. circular, straight, or double pointed), solid coloured yarn in a light to medium tone, and a cable needle. Size your yarn and needles appropriately (i.e. 4-5 mm needles for a worsted weight yarn). The finished project will be a headband.. This is a masked event.

Time: 7:00 pm - 9:00 pm.

Place: Guild Room, upstairs at 2880 – 15th Avenue.

Material Fee: \$20 members or \$30 non-members plus GST. **PRE-REGISTRATION REQUIRED (on-line).** Class size is limited to 6.

Into the Zone: the drafting zone with Diana Twiss

Saturday, April 22nd

Time: 9:00am to 4:00pm

Place: Jack Bryant Room at 2880 – 15th Avenue

We start the day spinning our default yarn. Then we move into learning five drafting techniques starting with short forward draw, short backward draw, and so forth, ending with the supported long draw. We work with prepared fibre: combed top for the first three and carded rovings for the last two drafting techniques. Students put a sample of the yarn on their card stock sample card and also make a mini-skein of each. We then wash the mini-skeins and we compare these to the unwashed samples. Each participant will identify their preferred drafting technique and will work the rest of the day (usually ½ - 1 hour) practicing it.

Fee: \$150 members or \$175 non-members plus GST

Material fee: \$20 payable to instructor

Supplies and equipment that spinners need to bring to class: Spinning wheel in excellent operating order, lazy kate, extra bobbins, hand carders, tapestry needle, small scissors. *Spinning wheels with bobbins, lazy kates and hand carders available to rent from Guild.*

Be the Boss of Your Yarn with Diana Twiss

Sunday, April 23rd

Time: 9:00am to 4:00pm

Place: Jack Bryant Room at 2880 – 15th Avenue

We start the day spinning our default yarn. Then we make a series of two-ply two coloured samples using low-twist singles and low-twist plying; low-twist singles and high-twist plying; high-twist singles and low-twist plying; high-twist singles and high twist plying. These samples are put onto a card stock template. This allows us to examine them, compare their angle of twist and feel their softness. We discuss under what conditions we would want each kind of yarn and finally, try to locate our default yarn. The afternoon is spent building on this knowledge of manipulating the twist in singles and plying, by making soft singles, 2-ply; 3-ply; cabled yarn, and chain plied yarn. At the end of the day, YOU will be the boss of your yarn.

Supplies and equipment that spinners need to bring to class: Spinning wheel in excellent operating order, lazy kate, extra bobbins, hand carders, tapestry needle, small scissors. *Spinning wheels with bobbins, lazy kates and hand carders available to rent from Guild.*

For the Navajo (chain) plying exercise, please bring a bobbin with approximately 10g spun wool singles – created at least a week in advance of the workshop.

Level of experience required: Must be able to spin a continuous thread and be comfortable with plying.

Needle Felted Flowers

Ulyana will be showing us some more tips and tricks in needle felting. The Guild has a medium gray felt that can be used for the background, or you can bring your own, but remember it has to be a wool felt. The Guild also has dyed fibre that can be used. You can bring your own – shades of green for the leaves and stems, whatever colours you want to use for flowers. You will need a fine and medium felting needle. If you don't have any, they can be purchased from the Guild for \$5.00 for a pack of three (fine, medium, coarse). You will need a large (8" x 4") sponge – like those for washing cars. One of our local dollar stores will likely be the best place to find one, price-wise. The silicone protectors for your fingertips might also be a good idea.

April showers bring May flowers, but Fibre Artist know...

Wool provides warmth even when it's wet. The key is kink: wool fibers have regular crimps. When they're spun into yarn, the kinks don't quite match up, trapping pockets of insulating air. The fibers themselves have an outer layer of tiny scales coated with lanolin, a waxy substance that repels moisture and preserves the air pockets. The scales overlap like shingles, locking and tangling together, making the surface even more water-repellent. And wool has another advantage for it doesn't need much cleaning. Airing and a bit of rinsing might be all the cleaning it needs, even after weeks of wearing.


