**The Nightingale (2018) - A
Brief Film Review**

Recently I was scrolling through Netflix looking for something to watch and stumbled upon a 2018 film entitled "The Nightingale" starring Irish actress Aisling Franciosi. Set in 1825 in the English penal colony of Van Diemen's Land (present-day Tasmania), the film follows a young female convict seeking revenge for terrible acts of violence committed against her and her family. Filmed mostly in English, the movie also has some scenes in Irish and Palawa kani. I must caution potential viewers. The movie is a very violent, disturbing, upsetting, and graphic depiction of life in Van Diemen's land during this historic era.

If for one had never spent much time studying what life was like for Irish "convicts" in Van

Diemen's land. As a student of history, I was familiar with this penal colony and the many Irish who were sent there against their will. Furthermore, I had no idea how this famous British penal colony impacted the native population of Tasmania. This film brings many horrible truths to life. I have written about General Thomas Francis Meagher and his time in Van Diemen's land with his dramatic and epic escape to America. But what of the common, normal, even peasant class Irish who in many cases were unjustly sent to Van Diemen's land never to return to the Emerald Isle? This movie has sparked my interest in reading and researching this part of the Irish diaspora. It must have been terrifying for these Irish, banished to this foreign land, and still considered subhuman and inferior. An island prison in a sense, where these Irish "convicts" were considered slightly above that of the native and aboriginal population.

As I often tell my students, the study of history is at times uncomfortable and upsetting. As the famous historian and film maker Ken Burns remarked, a true study of history "means reckoning with a history fraught

with violence and injustice. Ignoring that reality in favor of mythology is not only wrong but also dangerous. The dark chapters of history have just as much to teach us, if not more, than the glorious ones, and often the two are intertwined. What was done to the Irish and aboriginal population in Tasmania is truly disturbing. But by merely talking about these difficult topics, we remember those who had these heinous atrocities committed upon them. The film was criticized by some for being too graphic. But the directors of the film defended the decision to show such violence, saying that the film contains historically accurate depictions of the violence and racism which was inflicted upon the indigenous and Irish people of that time. The film was produced in collaboration with Tasmanian Aboriginal elders who asserted that this is an honest and necessary depiction of their history and a story that needs to be told.

As the film is set in 1825 it is essentially marking the beginning of "The Black War". This was a period of violent conflict between British colonists and Aboriginal Tasmanians in Tasmania from the mid-1820s to 1832. The conflict, fought largely as a guerrilla war by both sides, claimed the lives of 600 to 900 Aboriginal people and more than 200 European colonists, nearly annihilating the island's indigenous population. The frequent incidences of mass killings resulted in the near destruction of the aboriginal Tasmanians.

I would highly recommend this film for those who would like a glimpse into this era of Irish history. Seeing this graphic depiction of Van Diemen's land has further demonstrated the resolve and strength of the Irish people to overcome adversity. The painful truth of British colonial rule extended far beyond Ireland to this distant, strange, and unfamiliar land the Irish diaspora called Van Diemen's land.

Impossibly Easy Chicken Pot Pie

Ingredients

- 2** tablespoons cold water
- 1** tablespoon fresh lime juice
- 1 1/2** teaspoons unflavored gelatin
- 4 oz** (half of 8-oz package) fat-free cream cheese, softened
- 3** containers (6 oz each) Yoplait® Light Thick & Creamy Key lime pie yogurt
- 1/2** cup Cool Whip lite frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 2** teaspoons grated lime peel
- 1** reduced-fat graham cracker crumb crust (6 oz)

Steps



- 1** In 1-quart saucepan, mix water and lime juice. Sprinkle gelatin on lime juice mixture; let stand 1 minute. Heat over low heat, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly, about 2 minutes.



- 2** In medium bowl, beat cream cheese with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth. Add yogurt and lime juice mixture; beat on low speed until well blended.

- 3** Fold in whipped topping and lime peel. Pour into crust. Refrigerate until set, about 2 hours.



Tips from the Betty Crocker Kitchens

- tip 1 Research shows that eating 3 daily servings of low-fat calcium-rich dairy foods like yogurt can play an important role in weight loss plans.
- tip 2 The extra-tart Key lime is smaller, rounder and yellower than the standard Persian limes found at most grocery-stores. When purchasing, look for smooth-skinned, heavy limes. These are indications the fruit is fresh and juicy.
