This newsletter finds most of us huddled inside from the cold. Lucky are those that have headed south, albeit paying the price given the exchange rates.

Dianne Lehmann, Isaac Verbaas, S/M Leilani Collins and myself attended Calgary in late January to attend an information session concerning a Federal Government initiative addressing veterans who are homeless or facing such dire consequences. The Federal Minister for Housing, Infrastructure, Communities Canada (HICC) has provided funding to the RCMPVA and other entities to develop partnerships and supports for Veterans.

While this initiative is primarily geared towards Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) Veterans, we are very fortunate that the RCMP has the same standing as CAF veterans on this issue.

The RCMPVA has received funding to help establish and support this program as it relates to RCMP Veterans. The initial touchpoint for this potential assistance for RCMP Veterans would be through the local Division member advocates with a National Coordinator based in Ontario. The extent of just how many RCMP Veterans are homeless is unknown but not believed to be significant. Having said that, we did lose a retired "D" Division member in the recent past who had been evicted and living in his vehicle and subsequently succumbed to hypothermia. Homelessness is a multi-faceted issue with more information and questions likely to surface moving forward.

We are a tight group here in Edmonton, but should you hear of an RCMP Vet having issues with homelessness or other issues, please reach out to them and encourage them to seek help through our Advocacy Program or refer them to us yourselves. Privacy and confidentiality is promised.

The fact that this potential issue has been identified, and proactive measures being taken, is a good step in providing outreach and support to the RCMP Veteran Community. For further information refer to:

The Veteran Association is more than a Food Bank. It is a safe place. The Veterans Helping Veterans initiative is a program developed to connect to what is needed by Veterans and their families. It's an ongoing program that's growing and evolving as VAFB does.

Currently, The VAFB serves Veterans in Calgary, Lethbridge, Edmonton, and Grande Prairie. We are

growing our programs and reaching out to more Veterans than we thought possible. The work is never done, and we will never give up.

We understand that reaching out for support services as a Veteran can be challenging. At the Veterans Association, we want to assure you that we:

- Treat all Veterans with dignity and respect.
- Operate a food bank that will sustain the needs of our Veterans.

- Encourage all Veterans in our community to be a part of the Veterans Helping Veterans initiative.



## Alberta RCMP renews partnership with Métis Settlement General Council

In early December, the Alberta RCMP and the Métis Settlement General Council officially renewed our partnership. In April 2013, the original Memorandum of Understanding came into effect, outlining the duties and responsibilities of the Alberta

RCMP in providing enhanced policing services to Métis Settlement communities. In preparation of a new agreement, for the past year, the Alberta RCMP has been working with the Métis Settlement Councils to understand the specific needs of their communities. As a result, enhanced policing positions for Métis Settlements are a part of the new agreement.

Our Métis Community Liaisons work closely with Métis Leadership on recruiting and crime prevention initiatives specific to the Métis community. Building and maintaining positive relationships with community stakeholders is crucial for the organization's mandate and service delivery.







## Airdrie RCMP combat theft during proactive holiday patrols

On the evening of December 23, Airdrie RCMP engaged in proactive holiday patrols in the city's South Main Street shopping district. After a traffic stop was initiated due to a suspicious vehicle, officers located contraband tobacco. A further search was initiated which resulted in approximately \$3,300 of stolen merchandise, illegal drugs, and weapons to be revealed.

The following was seized as a result of the traffic stop:

- 105 grams of Methamphetamine
- 24 grams of Fentanyl
- Drug paraphernalia conducive to drug trafficking
- Stolen merchandise
- Contraband tobacco
- Various weapons

Three adults were arrested and charged as a result of the 45investigation; year-old Joseph Evans of Calgary, Alta., 37-year-old Stephanie Podetz of Strathmore, Alta., and 26-year-old Jordyn Elliot-Thorpe



of Calgary, Alta. All are scheduled to appear for associated charges on January 25, 2025, at Airdrie Provincial Court.

## **Ribbon Skirt Day**

January 4 marked the third annual Ribbon Skirt Day in Canada.

A number of Alberta RCMP employees have proudly been wearing their Ribbon Skirts for the past year at ceremonies and special occasions across Alberta. Ribbon Skirts represent a direct connection to Mother Earth and are a profound symbol of Indigenous culture, identity, and empowerment.

Advancing reconciliation with Indigenous peoples continues to be a priority for the Alberta RCMP, built on acknowledging past harm, listening with respect, and taking positive actions to improve our shared future.








#### **Sirens for Life**

Many Alberta RCMP members and employees rolled up their sleeves for the Canadian Blood Service's annual Sirens for Life campaign. Canadian Blood Services needs 450 new donors every day to meet Canada's growing demand for blood, and many of our own rose to the occasion to help fulfill this need.

Our employees embraced the campaign alongside other emergency responders, making a difference together to help meet the need for blood in Canada.

#### **Operation Cold Start**

As the temperature dropped and snow started to fall, the Alberta RCMP once again partnered with law enforcement partners across the province for Operation Cold Start. The initiative is designed to work with the public to reduce the theft of idling vehicles during winter months. This year, the campaign ran from Jan. 20, 2025 to Jan. 24.

Our members went out into the community and performed a variety of tasks to help keep vehicles safe. They checked unattended, idling vehicles to see if keys were in them, and whether or not they were properly secured. Officers also spoke to motorists to educate them on how to keep their vehicles safe.

During the campaign, our members noted there were 504 unlocked vehicles left idling with keys in the ignition and 1,277 locked vehicles left idling with keys in the ignition. Officers interacted with 625 vehicle owners and provided 1,128 information pamphlets.

Actively engaging with the community is a great opportunity to foster a healthy relationship that can benefit both our organization and the public. Initiatives like Operation Cold Start are a great chance to do this.



## **Crime Stoppers sign launch**

On Jan. 20, the RCMP hosted Crime Stoppers at the Alberta RCMP headquarters in Edmonton to announce Crime Stoppers' new Rural Sign Campaign.

The new campaign aims to bring smaller communities together, raise awareness for Crime Stoppers, and encourage citizens to get involved in their community. It signals that anyone can be a Crime Stopper and contribute to making Alberta a safe place to live, work, and play.

Community partners like Crime Stoppers are a valuable part of ensuring the

safety of Albertans. They help report crimes that are occurring in communities across the province, and they also allow tips to come in anonymously, encouraging reports from citizens who may otherwise refrain.

In 2024, tips from Crime Stoppers helped lead to hundreds of charges being laid and millions of dollars' worth of property to be recovered.

Crime Stoppers is committed to working with rural jurisdictions and Indigenous communities to place signs in high traffic locations. The City of Wetaskiwin and Piikani First Nation are already Crime Stoppers Communities, and the organization is in talks with other communities, as well.
