- 2. Membership Fee, 50c, which includes four exhibits. Separate or additional entries, 10 cents each.
- 3. Waugh Shield Membership Fee 25 cents, which allows free admission to show, Garden Seeds and Free Entries in Waugh Shield Garden Competiton and Class XI.
- 4. Entries for Exhibition must be made in writing to the Secretary not later than August 15th.
- 5. All Exhibits must be in place by 10:30 a.m. prompt on the first day of the Exhibition and must remain until 9:30 on August 18th.
- 6. All Exhibits must be grown by the Exhibitor.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS—Continued

- 7. Waugh Shield Children's Flower and Vegetable Exhibits must have been grown in their home or school garden under Waugh Shield Competition Rules. See Page No. 10.
- 8. Where stated that foliage may be employed with exhibits, the following varieties only will be allowed—the natural foliage of the blooms exhit ted, Perennial Gypsophlia, Latifolia, Statice and Asparagus.
- 9. Exhibitors may make as many entries in any section as they wish, but only one prize will be awarded in any one section.
- 10. The first, or any other prize, may be reduced in value or withheld entirely, in any section where the Judges consider the exhibits are too few in number or are not of sufficient merit to justify the full award being made; or where any fraud or deception has been attempted by the exhibitor.
- 11. Only one person from a residence can take a prize in any one section in Classes I to IX, inclusive.
- 12. Any competitor may appeal from the decision of the Judges by lodging a written complaint, with the Secretary, togother with a protest fee of \$5.00 which will be forfeited in case the appeal is not sustained. All appeals must be made on the day of judging.
- 13. In Class I the first finding of the Judges will be final.
- 14. Though the Committee of Management will give the best care possible to all exhibits, no responsibility is assumed in case of theft, damage or loss in other ways.
