As Henry Wadsworth Longfellow pointed out many years ago: "Into each life a little rain must fall." I have to tell you that back in the very early spring of 1991, a deluge appeared to be falling in mine.

My wife had succumbed to esophageal cancer after nearly two years of heartbreaking, mostly silent agony. She had fought back against this scourge of humanity that claimed her life at just 46 years of age, with a quiet will to live that was a lesson in fortitude and courage for everyone who knew her. But it had been soul-destroying and hard to endure for me and my two young sons. And now, we were devastated.

Metaphorically, Longfellow's rain was still beating down at her funeral, and when I went home to what had been a happy, joyful retreat from a noisy, bustling world, it was to find an unbearable quietness that resisted all attempts to penetrate.


I had asked the priest who conducted the service to write a few apt words in my King James' Bible that I have owned since it was presented to me by the church when I was 12 years old. I looked at the

wise words he had written and then closed the fading covers of the old scriptures, hardly looking at the name that had been appended. Fast-forward to the present and my wife Bonnie and I are somewhat recent members of this parish. Thirty-three years have passed, and Bonnie, (who lost her first husband at 47 to the same scourge) had presented our esteemed Rector, Canon Lance with the outline model of the Church of the Ascension that I had constructed for him. It was a happy moment and I asked Father Lance if he would write a few words in my old bible that he felt might be appropriate.

As he looked at the curling, yellowing pages, disfigured by the relentless passage of time, he turned abruptly to me and said, to my astonishment: "This is the signature of Father Don." Now, if I say I "was taken aback" I would be guilty of uttering one of the greatest understatements ever made. In fact, I was absolutely astounded. For there it was, in black and white, "Rev. D. Hull," who at that time was an assistant priest at Ascension. I had asked him to do the same thing all those years ago and now we had met again and neither had recognized the other.


Slowly, some of the wise, consoling words he had quietly spoken on that "rainy Longfellow day" more than three decades ago, started to come back to me. And as we sat later discussing how fate had brought us together once again, Bonnie grabbed my phone and decided to make a permanent record with a photograph. I'll let Longfellow have the last words: "Behind the clouds is the sun..... still shining."

You might be interested to know that the Church of the Ascension serves as the spiritual home not only to the parish to which you

belong, but also to a Christian ecumenical charity, The Sovereign Military Order of the Temple of Jerusalem, more commonly known as the Knights Templar. Our Priory here in Windsor is part of an International Order (https://www.osmth.org/) in more than 22 countries worldwide, holding Non-Governmental Organization Special Consultative Status to the United Nations Economic and Social Council and Membership of the International Peace Bureau. Our Priory of the Ascension of our Lord, was created in 2001 under the leadership of the Venerable Commander Dr. Sir Ronald Matthewman. Our Priory follows the Christian ideals of the International Order in humanitarian work, supporting all peoples afflicted by poverty, injustice, conflict and disaster, regardless of their creed or ethnic background. Ninety-eight percent of being a Dame or Knight Templar means committing to the four 'pillars' that underpin our chivalric charity: Christian values; Domestic and international aid; Respect for human rights and diversity; and Interfaith dialogue and bridge-building.

What is the other two per cent of being a Dame or Knight Templar you ask? We gather for dinner meetings where we share reports on our activities and impacts. They also allow us to hear presentations from community members wishing to educate us as to opportunities for us to support those in need. For example, we recently had a presentation from HOPE Outreach of Canada, https://hopeoutreach.ca/, who seek to improve living conditions in Bethlehem, promote reconciliation between religions and sponsor children's camps of differing faith traditions.

Once a year we hold a special event, a 'convent', which serves as an occasion to invest new members into the order, promote members who have shown outstanding service to our Christian values, and a less common occurrence: this year we installed a new Prior. Me!

These special occasions serve as a wonderful opportunity to share time and thoughts with priories from across Canada and even from other chivalric orders. For example, here we see former Grand Prior of Canada, Nola Crewe from the priory in Toronto, Prior Nicole Lassaline from the priory in Ottawa and outgoing Prior VI of our priory, Gillian Matthewman.

You might ask yourself, who are these people, how did they come to be involved in such a charity? They are people like you! Of the more than seventy active members in our priory, one of them will be sitting in a pew next to yours, or possibly seated right beside you! My involvement began when the late great Dr. Ev Morris asked me whether I might be interested. It sounded like a fine opportunity to not only find an active outlet for my Christian ideals, but also to be part of a larger body capable of far more impact than I could achieve on a personal basis. After a period of personal reflection I determined that the cause that resonated most strongly with me was the interfaith dialogue and bridge building. Others might find their calling to be in supporting the numerous local charities and grass-roots organizations that support those in our community who are in various kinds of need. A New Senator Appointed to the Rector's Senate




Rewarded for a job well done, over and over.....
